MARIPOSA TOWNSHIP COUNCIL.

Mariposa Township Council met this 8th day of August, 1881. Members all present. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

The Clerk read the Treasurer's financial statements showing as per Treasurer's books a balance in hand to date of \$1,350.00.

A. Hudspeth, Esq., counsel for Mr. Banks, was heard on the matter of selling certain streets in the village of Oakwood as asked for by Petition from Mr. Banks and others.

The following sums were granted to indigent persons: Mary Harden in care of T. Broad, \$3.00; Mrs. Sweetland, \$2.00; J. H. Kennedy in care of W. Parkinson, \$10.00; Blews family in care of A. Cameron, \$4.00.

An application was received from the trustees of School Section No. 16, asking the Council to raise by way of Loan and issue Debentures for \$1,600 to erect a new School house.

The following accounts were passed and ordered to be paid: T. Franks for breaking stone, \$3.00; T. Keeley services as constable, \$2.00; J. F. Cummings fees for registering Births, Marriages and Deaths, 6 months to June 30th, 1881, \$12 50.

Moved by Mr. Broad, seconded by Mr. Parkinson that By-law No. 272, being a by-law to raise by assessment on the rateable property of the township of Mariposa the sum of \$13,314.00 for the year 1881 be now read a first time. Carried.

The By-law No. 272 after passing through committee was read a third time and finally passed.

Council adjourned to meet again on the last Monday in August.

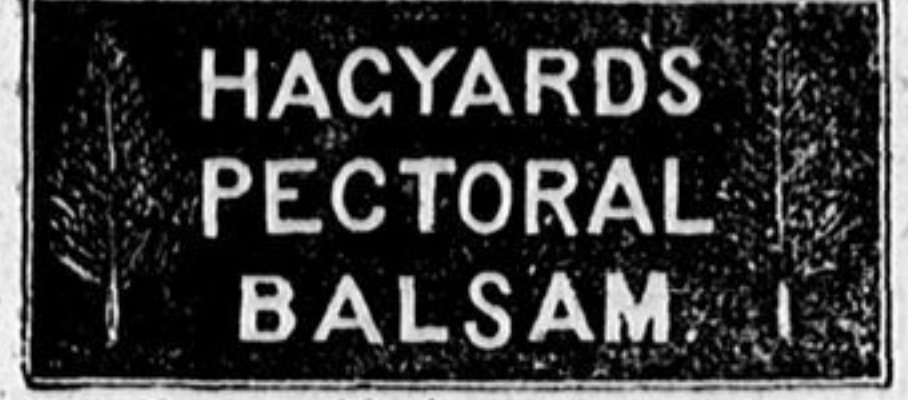
