PICTURESQUE CANADA. -Numbers 9 and 10 have just been received. We are now carried into the lumbering districts of the Upper Ottawa and Nipissing, and our chief Canadian industry is very liberally illustrated. Some of the views are especially fine and delicately executed, while the letter press, by Principal Grant, is terse and descriptive.

THE Millers' Association of Waterloo County have decided not to accept the wheat known as Aranecta. It not having nearly the same milling qualities of other wheats. Considerable Aranecta is grown in this neighbourhood, but last year the disparity in price being so great decided many of our farmers to discard it. The Association also recommend to farmers the cultivation of the following varieties of fall wheat for milling qualities, viz: Mediterranean, Scott, Michigan, Amber, Democrat, and Treadwell. The Falz, was condemned as unsatisfactory, and it was decided that 5c. per bushel less be paid for it than the other varieties of fall wheat.

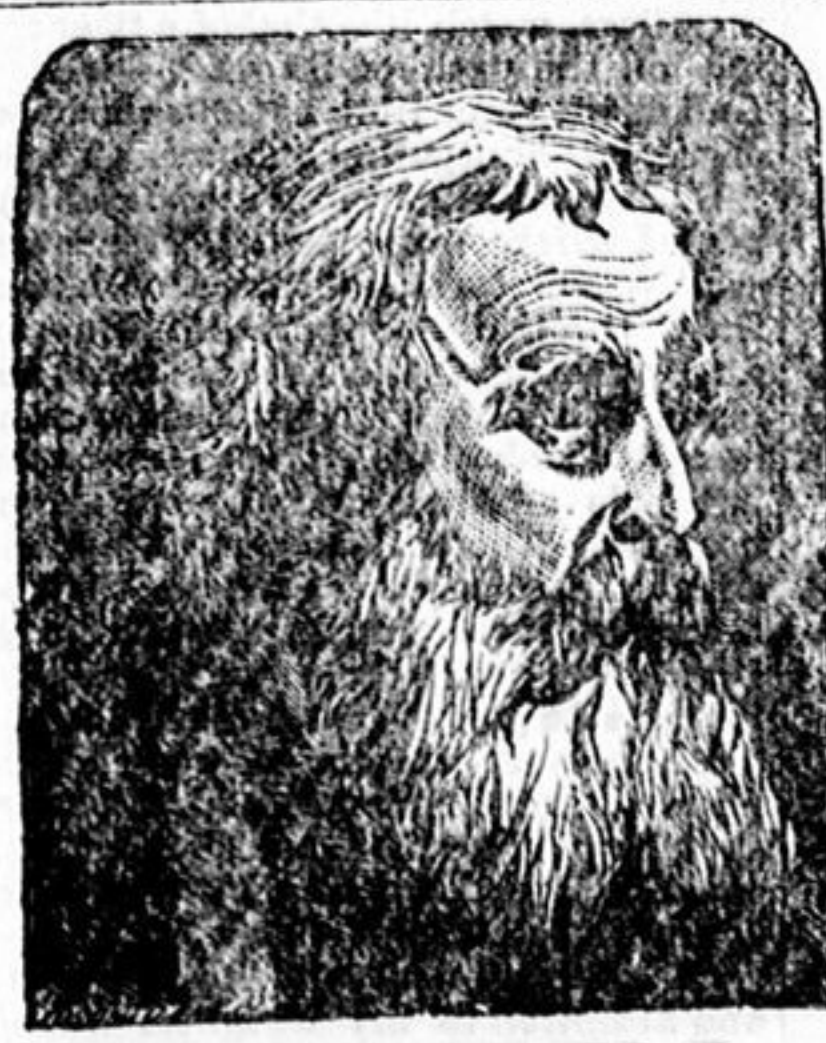
