

Thorah Township Council.

July 28th 1888. Council met at two o'clock p. m. All present. Minutes of the last two councils read and approved. Report of Road Commissioner put in and read. Letter from James Glendenning Esq., Reeve of Breck, in the matter of repairs on the townline, read. Letter from Maggie McMichael, to the Reeve of Beaverton in the matter of Mrs. Colville, read. Duncan Gillespie's claim for sheep killed by dogs, one ewe valued at \$6.00. Affidavit made and evidence heard. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Morrison, that Mr. Duncan Gillespie be allowed \$4.00, 2/3 value of sheep killed.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Fraser, that the Road Commissioner be authorized to amend the contract for the bridge on the townline of Eldon at the 6th concession, provided the Commission of the township of Eldon sanction the amendment. 2.—That he meet the Commissioner of the township of Brock on the townline of Brock at lot 8 in Thorah and let a contract for such repairs as are needed at that place to keep the road passable for the present year. 3.—That he repair and raise the road between cons. 5 and 6, at the west end of the bridge at lot 7.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Brown, seconded by Mr. Galloway, that Mr. John Morrison, Pathmaster, be instructed to repair the culvert on the side road between lots 5 and 6, cons. 7 and 8 and remove such stones as are obstructing the roadway at that place.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Fraser, that the by-law to open the original allowance for road between the 8th and 9th cons., at lots 1, 2, and 3 be now read the 2nd time. By-law read 2d time. Messrs. Hicks, Grant and M. Dougal heard in reference to the said road. By-law laid over. Mr. Dorald McRae put in a claim for compensation for land taken for the road at lot 5, con. 1, \$85.00. Mr. McRae heard in the matter. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Fraser, that Mr. Donald McRae's claim for compensation be laid over for further evidence.—Carried. In reference to the application for aid to support Mrs. Colville, living in Beaverton, Moved by Mr. Fraser, seconded by Mr. Brown, that this council would not be justified in making provision for the support of indigents living outside the corporation limits.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Fraser, that the sum of \$232.72, being the Beaverton share of the money received from the G. T. R. be paid to the treasurer of the corporation of Beaverton, deducting therefrom the sum of \$216.82, the amount due the corporation of Thorah on the debit account.—Carried. A number of accounts were then presented and ordered to be paid. Moved by Mr. Brown, seconded by Mr. Fraser, that the council do now adjourn until Saturday August 11th, to meet at 6 o'clock p. m.—Carried.

District Gleanings.

Mr. O. Bagshaw, of Vroomantou, happened with serious loss last Monday having lost his horse and barn by fire. The loss is a heavy one and Mr. Bagshaw has the sympathy of the entire neighborhood. We are not informed whether or not there was any insurance on the buildings.

It is some years since the building contractors in Oshawa have been so busy as they are this summer, and outside help has to be obtained. The most pleasing feature in this connection is the enlargement of several of the manufacturing industries.

Wednesday afternoon of last week two little girls, aged 7 and 11 years, daughters of John Scolar, of Ennismore, while playing in the house of their brother, who is postmaster at Ennismore, found a loaded revolver. A cartridge exploded while it was in the hands of the elder child and the younger one was shot in the forehead. Physicians were summoned but the child died at 10 o'clock, 5 hours after the accident. The bullet entered the forehead and travelled back and was taken out at the back of her head.

Down in eastern Ontario, cattle—and good cattle, too—are selling from \$6 to \$12 per head, owing to the scarcity of fodder. The prophecy that we would be scarce of fodder around here has proved groundless, there being plenty, and it would be good policy for our farmers to increase their stock by taking advantage of the low prices east of us. The Americans are down there buying up large numbers at a sacrifice.

The West Oxford Cheese and Butter Company intend making another large cheese which will weigh 5,000 pounds. This will be the largest yet made by the company.

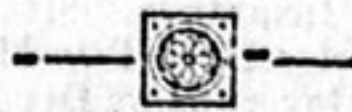

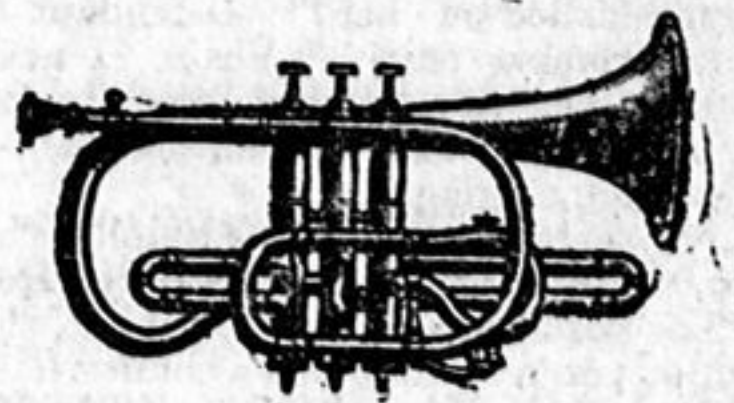
