The Coming Pic-nic.

The Liberal-Conservative pic-nic which is being prepared for by the Conservatives of this place is to be held on Thursday Sept. 6th 1888, in Mr. Alex. Hamilton's fine grove at the Lake Shore. Distinguished speakers of the party will be present and we notice among the names, Hon. Sir. Jno. A. Macdonald, Hon. J. A. Chapleau and others. We hope this affair, so far as Beaverton is concerned, will not be restricted to the usual narrow limits of a strictly party gathering. It is true these gentlemen are representative of the Conservative party but it should also be remembered that in their official capacity they are representatives of all parties so far as the Dominion of Canada is concerned. In this broad sense all should make it a point to be present, both Liberal and Conservative. Sir. John Macdonald and his colleagues disburse the taxes of Liberal and Conservative alike and we know of no reason why one should not be as interested in these gentlemen and their mode of administration as the

other. All may not agree as to its wisdom, but all should be interested in knowing what is being done and what is proposed for the future by those who at present manage the business of this great Dominion. We noticed quite a generous sprinkling of Conservatives at the Liberal pic-nic at Cannington on Tuesday and we may say with pleasure. Not only is it an indication of the breaking down of those harsh party feelings, which have so long held people apart, but it is a recognition of the fact that the people, who by the way, are the ones most largely interested, wish to hear both sides of public questions as presented by the parties. In this lies true wisdom. The man who for purely party reasons will maintain and support with his vote, which is his voice, that which reason tells him is not in the interests of the people is too dangerous a one to be trusted with so important an influence as the franchise. It is no disgrace, but rather an evidence of intelligent discrimination to find men voting as they think best independent of party, nor is it any reflection on political integrity, as is too often expressed, to be found carefully listening to the words of an opposite speaker and voting accordingly. We hope to see a large gathering here on the 6th.

CANNINGTON.

The Liberal demonstration held here on Tuesday was not so largely attended as could have been expected, but no doubt this was largely owing to the busy season of the year and the fact that the pic-nic was not well advertised. However a goodly gathering was present in Sharp's grove during the afternoon to listen to the various speakers. Mr. P. Lapp, the President of the Reform Association of the County of Ontario, occupied the chair. A lengthy programme was gone through and excellent addresses delivered by Messrs. A. P. Cockburn, ex-M. P., Wm. Mulock, M. P., Jno. A. Barron, M. P., Hon. Chas. Drury, M. P., and the Hon. Wilfrid Laurier. The latter gentleman was of course the speaker of the occasion and delivered an excellent address in which he carefully laid down the future policy of the Liberal party in connection with the question of Commercial Union and advocated a free and unrestricted commercial intercourse with the American people. His address was an eloquent and highly patriotic one and entirely free from the usual stock political arguments and hackneyed comparisons. Mr. Laurier made an excellent impression and his ready wit and repartee was much admired. He was followed by Hon. Chas. Drury, the newly appointed Minister of Agriculture for Ontario. Mr. Drury made one of his characteristic speeches being carefully worded and to the point. The Hon. gentleman is a speaker of great force and his remarks always have the excellent recommendation of being practical. Being a farmer and an enthusiast in agriculture he can appeal to an agricultural audience with excellent success while his practical and well-thought-out ideas are generally convincing. Three bands, viz., Uxbridge, Beaverton and Cannington were present and helped to enliven the proceedings by excellent music.

Last week, Roy Harper, the three-year-old son of Irvil Harper, fell to the sidewalk from a balcony door in the second storey of the residence adjoining the Royal hotel, Whitby, miraculously escaping with a broken elbow.
