Editorial Motes.

(By the Editor or gathered from Exchanges.)

THE Hon. John S. D. Thompson, Minister of Justice has been created a Knight Commander of St. Michael and St. George, He now becomes Sir. John Thompson, K. C. M. G. and adds one more to the list of titled gentlemen, of which the Dominion of Canada is the happy possessor.

THE New York "Sun" estimates that "a Presidential campaign costs the country about \$20,000,000." This estimate covers all "legitimate expenditures" in all of the States, not for the national ticket alone, but for all tickets before the people in such a campaign. No attempt is made to calculate the illegitimate expenses, nor is the line rigidly drawn between legitimate and illegitimate use of money. Under the former are classed, of course, the printing and distributing of speeches, hall rent and pyrotechnic and other accompaniments of parades, music decorations, transportations, tickets, poll-workers, carriages, etc. These cost money and they are brought into play fully in a Presidential year, but \$20,000,000 is a good deal of money.

Ir has been well said, without wood no water, without water barrenness. European governments have undertaken the enterprise with system and energy. Twenty-five per cent. is regarded as the necessary proportion of forest in any country. In France, two hundred and fifty thousand acres have been planted with trees in the last twenty-five years. In Canada our forests are fast disappearing, while there are four hundred and fifty million acres of forest land yet in the possession of the Umted States, of which ten million acros are annually destroyed by fire, During last year Kansas planted one hundred and fifty thousand acres of trees and the State of New York owns about a million acres in the Adirondack region which the State has by law undertaken to take care of.

THE law regarding ticket scalping is about as big a humbug as one could wish to have. If a person buys a railway ticket and then don't require to take the ride he cannot sell it, as is the case with other property, but must take it back to the company and wait about two months to get it through the redtapeism of transmission to all the head and brauch offices on the road before it is redeemed. If the company has only had the money for the tickets five minutes before it is asked to be refunded, the two months' delay occurs just the same. The whole of our parkiaments seem to be in the service of railways. Out of one hundred and eighty members from Ontario in the Commons and Legislative assembly, only three men could be found who honestly paid their tare. Fifty-nine out of every sixty were thus proven to be dead-heads. The thing is simply a piece of rotten corruption and it is no wonder the railways get everything they ask for. It seems that the railway companies look over the returns after every election in order to pick out those who are to have free rides.-[Chronicle.]

that, spite of strained diplomatic relations, kindred people are full of that mutual regard which is hurrying the world toward the fulfilment of Burns' prophecy that "Man to man the world o'er shall brithers be for a' that." It would probably be wise for Government to ignore the President's buncombe and let the Royal Scots go. It is not, we suppose, mutual hatred so much as petty vanity that makes it the most popular thing in any country to swagger against another, however small. President Cleveland, who, until yesterday, would have polled almost every vote in Canada, has sacrificed his popularity here to what he expected to gain in hisown country by joining the noble band of Jingoes alongside of General Boulanger, William the Second and James G. Blaine. For one who knows all the facts of the case-how it was the action of the United States which threw Canada back against her will on the treaty of 1818-how Canada was so solicitous to avoid that condition of things that she almost entreated the United States to meet her with a view to a new agreement, or at least, to submit the existing state of things co disinterested arbitration; how the United States insolently rejected these proposals without a suggestion of reason other than that Canada was offensive as a dependency of Great Britain and was for herself too small a country to have any rights which the United States had any call to negotiate or arbitrate with, and how it was in answer to a yaunting denial of her rights in her own fisheries that Canada was forced to act in the spirit of the treaty of 1818-to call any action of Canada exasperating, is singularly out of harmony with that regard for the national dignity and honor about which the President talks so much. while his garrulity about the great generosity of the United States is Judicrous to say nothing about Pecksniff. However, it is fair to acknowledge that Mr. Cleveland has "gone one better" than Mr. Blaine in flonting the British Lion. We think the best cure for this sort of thing is such social amenities as are proposed, for the more the people meet each other the more they will respect each other.
