### Entrance Examinations.

The next entrance examination to high schools and collegiate institutes will be held on December 19th, 20th and 21st next. A circular stating the limits of studies in the various subjects has just been issued by the department. The timetable of the examination is as follows: First day—literature and writing; second day—arithmetic, drawing, composition and dictation; third day—grammar, geography and history. A paper on Agriculture will be set at the entrance examination in July 1889, but the subject will be an appendageal one

and any marks thereon will be counted as a bonus. There is no provision made in the circular for a paper on scientific temperance, which it was hoped might be placed on an equal footing in that respect with the subject of agriculture. The literature selections for teachers, third, second, and first class grade C. non-professional examinations have been prepared and are being issued.

Moved by Mr. Ferguson, seconded by Mr. Edwards that By-law No. 35 for levying the sum of \$800 on the rateable property of Woodville be read a second and third time and passed, and that the Reeve sign the same and attach the corporate seal thereto.—Carried. The Council then adjourned to meet on September 24th at 8 o'clock, p. m. in the Town Hall.
