KIRKFIELD.

From an Occasional Correspondent.

A really heavy rain has come to us last night, that of the 22nd inst., it rained here very copiously and has continued raining up to the present time. How very much we have longed for a heavy rain. For weeks we have been oppressed with drought, tormented with smoke, and harassed by fires, with which we have had to do much fighting. Your Kirkfield correspondent has already informed you of what a hard battle we had on the 31st ult--a battle in which the Kirkfield men, boys, women and girls, by brave and hard fighting saved from the fire the McKenzie Brothers' mill and factory. For the intrepidity that they displayed on that occasion the Kirkfielders of the gentler sex should be awarded Victoria crosses. By one of those great fires which on the 15th inst. were by the wind urged along in so swift a career of appalling devastation the Murray brothers, who live within a mile of Kirkfield, lost a stable, a shed, a barn and all its contents, which included about 2,000 bushels of grain, over one-third of which was wheat, and what of the best quality. At the very time the buildings just mentioned had got ablaze some of the Kirkfield men--a number of them happen ng to be away from home, had a hard fight with fire. The fight lasted from noon until ten o'clock at night, when a rain came and gave the Kirkfielders the aid that they were in extreme need of. A host of fires three of which were closing in on the village of Bolsover was by that rain stopped from then spreading farther. The rain, though, which lasted only a few minutes, was far from being heavy enough to be able to extinguish those great fires. So the night still looked awfully wild with great flames and immense volumes of smoke. But as the fire could not spread while the ground remained wet, the situation was one in which those who had grown weary fighting the terrible enemy could go and seek rest; so they betook themselves to their beds and sleep soon made them oblivious of the trying time they had through the day. On the 16th inst. and once since then we had to fight fire, but this equinoctial rain has extinguished all the fires that have raged so long in these parts. But too late! too late for us! it is this rain, we're ruined," are the words that would express the despondency that is felt by the numerous persons who, by the fires of which I have just been speaking, have lost the fruits of many years of industry.
