A little glycerine mixed with the oil used in blacking will keep the haress flexible much better than the oil alone. Most preparations for oiling harness contain glycerine, and owe to it most of their value.

Fire in Parkdale.

A Stranger fr m Woodville Placed Under

FIRE broke out in a stable owed by Mr. John T. Shewell, in rear of Gwynne-ayenue, Parkdale, on Saturday afternoon. Mr. Hugh MacMath, who was one of the first to arrive at the fire, savy a man about twelve feet from the building, waiking south, and asked him what he was doing there. He answered roughly, and as he would give no explanation of his presence there, Mr Mac-Math had him arrested. The fire had spread to a woodshed, about ten feet from the stable, but was extinguished at this point and confined to the stable, which was destroyed. The loss, including a cutter, which was burned, was about \$300; no insurance. In the evening the supposed Incendiary was tried before Mr. Wingfield, J. P. He gave his name as George Anderson, Woodville, and pleaded not guilty. Eliza Bennett, a girl eight years of age, safd she saw the prisoner in the hayloft before the fire, and that he ran out when he saw the blaze. The case was adjourned until Tuesday night. The prisoner is a respectable looking man, and a total stranger in the village. It is possible that a charge of trespass may be substituted for the grave accusation.
