## THIS AND THAT.

AS THE schooner Fred L. Wells was leaving Port Hope harbor at about two o'clock Wednesday morning, a sailor named Myron Enos, whose home is in Pultneyville, N. Y., and who was subject to fits, while at work unfurling the sails fell overboard and was drowned. The accident occurred inside the mouth of the harbour. The body was found Thursday morning by Michael O'Mealey.

We are pleased to hear of the reorganization of the 46th Battalion band of Port Hope. The 46th could boast for years of possessing one of the finest military bands on the continent and it is with pleasure we notice its resuscitation.

A few years ago tomatoes were known as love apples, and were regarded as poisonous. Last season the canning establishments of the United States put up 52,322,952 cans of tomatoes.

The Lindsay Drill Shed was destroyed by fire on Monday of last week. Supposed to be the work of incendiaries.

The Annis-Gaudaur boat race, rowed at Orillia on Wednesday of last week was an easy victory for Gaudaur who won by about five boat lengths. From the start he took the lead and maintained it throughout the entire race. Annis pulled a plucky race and pushed his man for all he was worth. No money of any account changed hands.

EMPLOYEES on the Midland division of the Grand Trunk railway have been notified to abstain from smoking while on duty.

ISAAC MURRAY, who died recently in the township of Vaughan, left \$40,000 for the establishment of a college in connection with the Lutheran church in Ontario.

UXBRIDGE offers a reward of \$500 for the arrest and conviction of the party who set fire to Urquhart's implement shop in that town. Incendiarism is getting terribly frequent.

A SMALL sized beetle, armed with a long proboscis, is destroying the potato bug in Halton.

AN Orillia gentleman decided last week to take his wife with him to Toronto and see the Mowat demonstration and the exhibition. Taking the G. T. R., they had to change cars at Blackwater and here the much travelled man and his better half became separated and were lost to each other in the densely populated Blackwater. After searching the streets and thoroughfares up and down and vainly ransacking all the lanes and alleys, the distracted husband applied to the chief of police for his assistance. The good chief telephoned to all the subordinate police stations and ordered his men out on the search, and after hunting diligently for a long time they brought the sorrowful couple together again who immediately returned to Orillia and vowed never to leave the dear old spot again.—Orillia Times.

JAKE GAUDAUR has challenged Wallace Ross again. This time he offers to allow Ross five seconds of a start on five miles.

CANADIAN cheese has again vindicated its claim to be a first-class article. European prejudice is very tardy in its recognition of Canadian rights but Mr. T. D. Miller, of Ingersoll, cheese maker and buyer, has received a cablegram stating that his exhibit of cheese at the Amsterdam exhibition has received first prize.

THE Grand Trunk station, Port Perry, was entered by burglars on Friday night last. The safe was drilled and broken open and what money it contained was taken. The loss will not be very heavy as the agent had removed the greater amount of cash from the safe, considering it no protection from burglars. The loss is divided between the G. T. R., the Canadian Express Co. and the agent.

It is with regret that we have to chronicle the death by drowning of Mr. John Morgan of Emily, on the 10th inst. The supposition is that the old gentleman was walking over the railroad bridge south-west of Omeeme when he missed his footing, and in falling was stunned by striking his head on the bridge, as there was quite a hole in his forehead. Deceased was 67 years of age, having been born in the County of Cork, Ireland, in 1817, emigrated to Canada in 1841, and was a respected resident of Emily for upwards of thirty years.—Omeeme Herald.

AN unknown tramp was run over and terribly mutilated at Scarborough, on Saturday night. All that could be found of his body was collected in a box and buried. Another tramp was found dead on Sunday at the same place. Both men had evidently been run over while stealing a ride on the trains.

We have on several occasions says the Brockville Recorder, given figures to show the enormous trade done in the export of eggs from this section of the province. There are a number of persons whose sole employment in the summer season is travelling through the country and buying up all the eggs they can secure, for which they pay cash at the farmer's door. According to the trade and navigation returns, for the year ending 30th June 1883, the last for which the figures are published, the export amounted to 13,451,410 dozen, valued at \$2,256,586. The whole of this enormous quantity, with a very small exception, goes to the United States and is packed in patent cases, which are returned over and over again to be refilled. It appears the Dominion Government has made up its mind to impose a duty on the empty cases when they come back to be re-filled. The duty amounts to about one-fourth the value of the cases, that is, by the time the crates have made four trips their value is equivalent to two cents a dozen on the eggs they contain, and the result will be that the purchaser can only afford to pay two cents a dozen less to the farmer for his eggs. This will entail a loss on the thirteen and a half million dozen exported, or nearly \$270,000 a year.
