Township of Thorah, '87.

BY-LAW NO. 4 OF 1887:

A BY-LAW to establish a road on lot number 6 in the 11th concession of Thorah. The Corporation of the Township of Thorah hereby enacts that the deviation of the road on lot number six in 11th concession of the Township of Thorah, as surveyed by Allan Cavana, P. E. S. and shown in his diagram attached to and forming part of this By-law and of which the following is the description that is to say:—commencing at a post planted in the centre of the tresspass road now travelled across the said lot 6 (known as the Mara road) the said post being fourteen chains and eight links on a course north thirteen degrees and forty minutes east from where the centre line of the said road on lot 6 intersects the northern limit of the road allowance between the fourth and eleventh concessions of the said Township of Thorah. Thence north 11 degrees and two minutes east—four chains and forty links more or less to the Talbot River—do, and the same is established, as a public highway of the Township of Thorah. And it is further enacted that the above described line shall be the centre of the said road—and that the said road shall be of the full width of sixty-six feet.
