The Great Conservative Demonstration. Beaverton En-Fete.

Triumphant Arches, Bands and Processions.

YESTERDAY was probably the most imposing day in the history of Beaverton for not only had her citizens made the village look extremely beautiful in the erection of arches and an indiscriminate decoration but a vast crowd of sight-seers and above all, interested citizens, gathered here to listen to the gentlemen who were announced to speak on the public question of the day and to welcome the Premier of the Dominion, Sir John A. Macdonald. The number of people in town could not possibly be short of four thousand and a greater gathering we do not think ever took place here. No outlay of labor or money appeared to be spared in decoration and the main arch on Simcoe street with its eight bright girls arrayed in white was as beautiful an object as could well be seen and would do credit to the resources of even the city. All places of business were generously decorated, Reformers and Conservatives alike sparing no effort to make things look well. That they succeeded could be readily ascertained from the remarks of the visitors and we venture to assert that the gentlemen of the Cabinet who were present never met from a place of its size a more graceful reception than that extended by the village of Beaverton. A keen disappointment was experienced and one which took considerable of the enthusiasm from the affair in the non-arrival of Sir John A. Macdonald, and the great crowd which had gathered at the station all anxiously waiting to welcome with cheers the Premier could not curb their disappointment sufficiently to raise one burst for his able Lieutenants. This can be readily understood when it is remembered that many in the large audience had come long distances to hear Sir John possibly expecting that he would speak pointedly as to the policy of the party as regards the now question of "Unrestricted Reciprocity with the United States" and also on the vexed "Fishery Question." After the usual mutual greetings, etc., a procession was formed headed by the 34th Batt. Band immediately followed by a carriage containing Hon. Mr. Foster, Minister of Finance, Hon. Charles Tupper, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Dr. Montague and the President of the Liberal-Conservative Association, Dr. Gillespie of Cannington, followed by carriages with other M. P.'s and leading gentlemen of the party from the different parts of the Riding interspersed with bands from Rama, Port Perry, Uxbridge, and Sunderland, the Beaverton band taking up the rear. The procession passed up Mara and Simcoe streets under the great arch, (upon which it had been arranged that eight young ladies, Misses Lexie McRae, Wyah Hamilton, Mabel Glasgow, Georgia White, Annie Stoddart, Annie Hodgson, Maud Tisdale and Minnie Musgrove, should sing the National Song, "Red, White and Blue" as the carriages passed and which they did with excellent effect,) up Osborne street to Bay, down Bay to Foundry then by way of Victoria street to the grove, which by the way has been named "Ethel Park" after Mr. Alex. Hamilton's charming young daughter, where the usual routine of address presentations was gone through. Here again the absence of Sir John was sadly felt as many of the addresses were especially prepared for him and consequently their reading had to be deferred. An adjournment followed for lunch, after which the speaking of the day took place. The chair was taken by the President of the Liberal-Conservative Association who introduced to the large audience which had assembled Mr. F. Madill, M. P., who with but few remarks made way for Mr. Jno. A. McGillivray, of Uxbridge, who also gave a short

vigorous address. The chairman then introduced Hon. Charles Tupper, the new Minister of Marine and Fisheries. This gentleman in the course of a long and brilliant address, discussed Commercial Union and the Liberal party's attitude towards it particularly. He expressed, we presume, the views of the Government on the subject and they are of positive antagonism to the whole scheme. He did not understand how we are to raise the revenue which would be forfeited, by not taxing the Canadian people for what they buy from the Americans and which in round figures reaches \$7,000,000, if the duties are taken off. In his way of thinking, no alternative other than that of direct taxation existed and this consummation was devoutly to be avoided. Any way he does not believe the United States would agree to any such arrangement. Space will not allow us to follow the Hon. gentleman through his long and careful speech but the Hon. Charles is certainly a clever speaker and one likely to be very effective. How the people accepted the situation could hardly be determined as careful attention was paid to the remarks of the speaker and but little effervescent applause occurred. He was followed by Dr. Montague, M. P., of Haldimand, who also is an excellent speaker. This gentleman paid particular attention to the Indians. Two chiefs of the Rama reservation being present on the platform gave him the opportunity to praise the intelligence and ability of their fellows in Haldimand. By the enfranchisement of the Indians (whether they properly understand and appreciate the dignity of citizenship or not, and from the remarks of the Doctor we can hardly believe they do), Sir John has placed a large number of followers at his back and it is to be hoped that this important factor of the electorate will receive every facility for becoming something more than voters. Dr. Montague is a ready and witty speaker and held his audience until the close. He was followed by the Hon. Geo. E. Foster, Minister of Finance, who devoted his time and attention to the present fishery complication. He gave a free and carefully worded resume of the situation and the various causes which had led up to the position of things to-day. He stoutly maintained that Canada has done all that is possible to bring about a settlement of the difficulty even to extending valuable concession to the United States from purely good will. He counsels the people, and we presume his counsel represents the position of the Ministry on the question, to keep cool and pay no attention to the bluster of the United States, strictly enforce an observance of the treaty rights and meet our neighbors when desired to do so with dignity and grace. Mr. Foster and the Ministry have this journal with them in this course and from the applause that followed the Hon. gentleman's remarks, they also will find the people of this district at their back. Dignity and honor is what we are after just now, and in the future the Minister of Marine and Fisheries should see to it that the great Canadian Cod receives a proper and dignified attention at the hands of our Southern Cousins. Retaliation comes with bad grace from the United States if what the Minister of Finance states is correct, and we have no reason to doubt his statements. All true Canadians should therefore stand out firmly against anything which would in the remotest degree approach a backdown from our position and give our Government a solid backing in its demand for justice and right. Mr. Foster is a most pleasing speaker and his choice and eloquent language is a treat to listen to. His resume of this great question was thoroughly appreciated by the great audience. His address nearly filled up the time allowed, leaving but scant room for those who followed him. Mr. Porter, M. P. for Huron, gave an interesting account of the advance of Ontario county during the past forty years and showed himself thoroughly alive to the advance the county has made. He was followed by Dr. Slaven, of Orillia when

the meeting closed in haste to meet the 5:35 train which had been delayed some time to accommodate the occasion. The ladies, we are told, more than surpassed themselves in their efforts to make the visitors at home and thoroughly impressed them with the generous hospitality of Beaverton and its people. The bands were all in attendance at the grove but on account of the prolixity of the speakers their duties were light. The best of feeling prevailed among them and a general turn in took place on the way from the grove to the town between the Rama, Sunderland, Cannington and Beaverton bands, who united in playing the stirring air, "British Grenadiers" with tremendous effect. Altogether the day will long be remembered in Beaverton and the community owe a vote of thanks to Mr. Madill and his supporters who brought the affair to so successful an issue.

District Gleanings.

Orangeville has now connections with Toronto by telephone.

The Bobcaygeon "Independent" gives the following dimensions of the largest maskinonge in that vicinity this season:—Length, 4ft. 4in., girth, 21 inches, spread of tail, 11 inches, head, 12 inches, weight, 29lbs., 4ozs.

Patrick Boland was taken to Toronto this week from Mount Albert and locked up in the jail to await trial on the charge of committing a rape on Clara Higgs. At the preliminary investigation before James Shields, J. P., in Mount Albert, Miss Higgs said that on Monday morning, between midnight and one o'clock, Boland and another man entered her house in East Gwillimbury and assaulted her. She identified Boland, but she could not say who his companion was. This being so, Archibald Goodwin, who had also been arrested was discharged, while Boland was held for trial.

The water by-law granting \$12,000 for waterworks for Shelburne has been carried by a majority of 24.

The railway station at Omemece was burned to the ground last week. An incendiary did the work.

Six barns were struck by lightning in the vicinity of Ingersoll during a thunderstorm on Sunday night.

Woodstock has a piggery out in the country where 750 hungry hogs consume the swill of the town.

Upwards of fifty thousand logs were lost on the Georgian Bay in the heavy storm of last week. They will most of them be picked up.

The Dominion Government granted \$15,000 for dredging Owen Sound Harbor and it is proposed to commence work at an early day.

A curiosity in the shape of potatoes growing from the stalk above ground instead of the roots has been sent to the office of the Acton "Free Press," by Mrs. Geo. Leslie, Erin.

The Coldwater station of the G. T. R. with an adjoining store was destroyed by fire last week.

A petition for the repeal of the Scott Act in the united counties of Northumberland and Durham is being circulated and is meeting with numerous signers, who have become thoroughly disgusted with the way in which the Act has been enforced in those Counties.

The Ontario exhibit of minerals at the Centennial Exposition, Cincinnati, is arousing so much interest among the visitors that Hon. Charles Drury, the Minister of Agriculture, has received a letter from Mr. J. H. Johnston, Secretary of the St. Louis Exposition, inviting the Government to give a similar exhibit there. The invitation will be accepted and as complete an exhibition as time will permit to be collected, will be sent.
