### Prizes of the Ocean.

Sperm whales, the monsters of deep water, are the richest prizes of the ocean, yielding spermataci from their brain cases, ivory from their jaws, rich yellow oil from their sides, and (when diseased) the almost priceless ambergris from the entrails. Next in value comes the right whale, the inhabitant of the Arctic, in whose mouth walebone is substituted for ivory. The upper jaw is furnished with this substance, a great pile of which lies high on the beach at Herring Cove. It is, perhaps, ten inches across where it joins the jaw and reminds one of a great comb with tangled hair attached than anything else. The "teeth" are closely set and are three feet or more long, tapering to a point and terminating in rope-like filaments. While the sperm whale feeds on squid at the bottom of the ocean, the right whale speeds along with open mouth, engulfing huge quantities of water and greater or less quantities of the animalcules and small fish on which it subsists. When his cavernous mouth is full, he closes it, blows out the water through his spout holes and with the aid of his tongue swallows the little creature, which has become immeshed in the curious attachment of his upper jaw.—[Cor. Baltimore American.]

### Work on the Nicaragua Canal.

The work on the Nicaragua canal will be begun in September of this year and will be finished in 1893. A careful calculation of the cost of the enterprise puts the amount at \$50,000,000 and the company is bonded for \$100,000,000. Fortunately, the men who are in the work are able by themselves to find all the money needed and we will not have to ask anybody for anything. The Nicaragua route is the only practical one. No matter how much money the French may raise—and they have already spent \$200,000,000 and will have to spend the same amount more—they have not got the natural road between the two oceans—and we have got it. Our canal can be built for \$50,000,000; theirs will cost eight times as much. Our route has a natural lake with thousands of feet of water at the top of the divide; they have nothing of the sort. We can raise the money and they cannot. Besides this, it stands to reason that the United States will not let any foreign power control the canal when it is built, and that is a factor which you must consider. Despite the tremendous expenditure of money at Panama, we in Central America have no faith in the canal there. De Lesseps cut through Suez, but that feat had been accomplished twice before. The Suez canal had twice been opened. Panama, however is new ground and practical engineers do not believe in his work or his conclusions. The proposed Tehantepec ship railroad (Eads' scheme), now being pushed by Col. Andrews, is met with equal incredulity. As long as it costs \$25,000 to dry dock a vessel like the Serbia we may be pardoned for refusing to believe in a scheme for taking vessels out of the water for an ordinary commercial toll.—[Edward James' Letter.]

### Origin of Colors.

From the cochineal insects are obtained the gorgeous carmine, as well as the crimson, scarlet, carmine and purple lakes. Sepia is the inky fluid discharged by the cuttlefish to render the water opaque, for its concealment when attacked. Indian yellow is from the camel. Ivory black and bone black are made of ivory chips. The exquisite Prussian blue is got by fusing horses' hoofs and other refuse animal matter with impure potassium carbonate. It was discovered by an accident. In the vegetable kingdom are included the lakes, derived from roots, barks and gums. Blue-black is from the charcoal of the vine stalk. Lampblack is soot from certain resinous substances. From the madder plant, which grows in Hindostan, is manufactured Turkey red. Gamboge comes from the yellow sap of a tree, which the natives of Siam catch in cocoanut shells. Raw sienna is the natural earth from Sienna, Italy. Raw umber is an earth from Umbria, and is also burnt. To these vegetable pigments may probably be added Indian ink, which is said to be made from burnt camphor. The Chinese who alone produce it, will not reveal the secret of its composition. Mastic—the base of the varnish so called—is from the gum of the Mastic tree, indigenous to the Grecian archipelago. Bistre is the soot of wood ashes. Of real ultramarine, but little is found in the market. It is obtained from the precious lapis-lazuli, and commands a fabulous price. Chinese white in zinc, scarlet is iodine of mercury, and cinnabar or native vermilion, is from quicksilver ore.

### Wheat from Seed 5,000 Years Ago.

A most interesting experiment culminated to-day in the raising of some wheat grown from seed as old as the Exodus. The experimenter is David Drew, who last year received from a friend in Alexandria, Egypt, some grains of wheat taken from a mummy exhumed near the ruins of Memphis, and belonging, it is believed, to the period of the Ninth Dynasty, which would make it grown about 3,000 B. C., or be nearly five thousand years old. He planted the seed early in the spring and carefully nursed it. It grew rapidly, and at the time of cutting measured from six and a half to seven feet high. The leaves afterwards on the stalk like common wheat, but the product of the plant is the most singular part of it, for, instead of growing to an ear like modern corn, there is a heavy cluster of small twigs in place of the spindle which hangs downward from its weight, and each twig is thickly studded with kernels, each of which is in a separate husk. From what is threshed a larger crop will be grown next year, as the result proves this ground to exceed in quality anything that the modern grain can grow.

### District Gleanings.

Simcoe is moving for a county poor-house.  
Barrie gave a concert in aid of the yellow fever sufferers of Jacksonville, Florida, on the 25th.

A fatal accident was caused last week in Walkerton by the frightening of a horse by the whistling of a steam thresher.

Perth county has eight cheese factories with an estimated value of a quarter of a million cheese in them at the present time.

Sampson Ingersoll, a Rama Indian, is authority for the statement that the wolves flock together in hundreds in the vicinity of the lower Severn.

A number of fine business blocks are being built at St. Mary's and the Maxwell foundry, erected at a cost of \$30,000, is nearly finished.

Aurora's rate of taxation is 1 1/2 cents on the \$100. Considering that the assessment [was raised 25 per cent. this is equal to 18 cents in the \$100 compared with previous years and there has been no reduction in insurance rates [yet as the water works and fire alarm system is only just completed.

No appeals have been made against the assessment of Markham village this year for the first time in several years. The assessment roll and voters' list will remain as they were confirmed by the Court of Revision.

Mr. R. Goulay, B. A., of Essex Centre high school, has been appointed mathematical master of Oshawa high school at a salary of \$900 per annum. His record is said to be good.

A crop of 1,000,000 bushels of buckwheat is expected in Prince Edward county this year.

Ald. Franklin, of Toronto, the cattle king, opens the Collingwood exhibition.

A gold mine has been discovered in the township of Storrington, north of Kingston.

Large shipments of apples and other fruit, are being made from Owen Sound and the surrounding district to Winnipeg and the Northwest.

A brass band of eleven young ladies and sixteen young gentlemen has been formed at Demorestville, county of Prince Edward.

At Cobourg John Blakely of the township of Percy, was found guilty of putting Paris green in a neighbor's field to poison his cattle, and sentenced to three months' imprisonment.

The water in Lake Ontario is about two feet lower now than at this time last year.
