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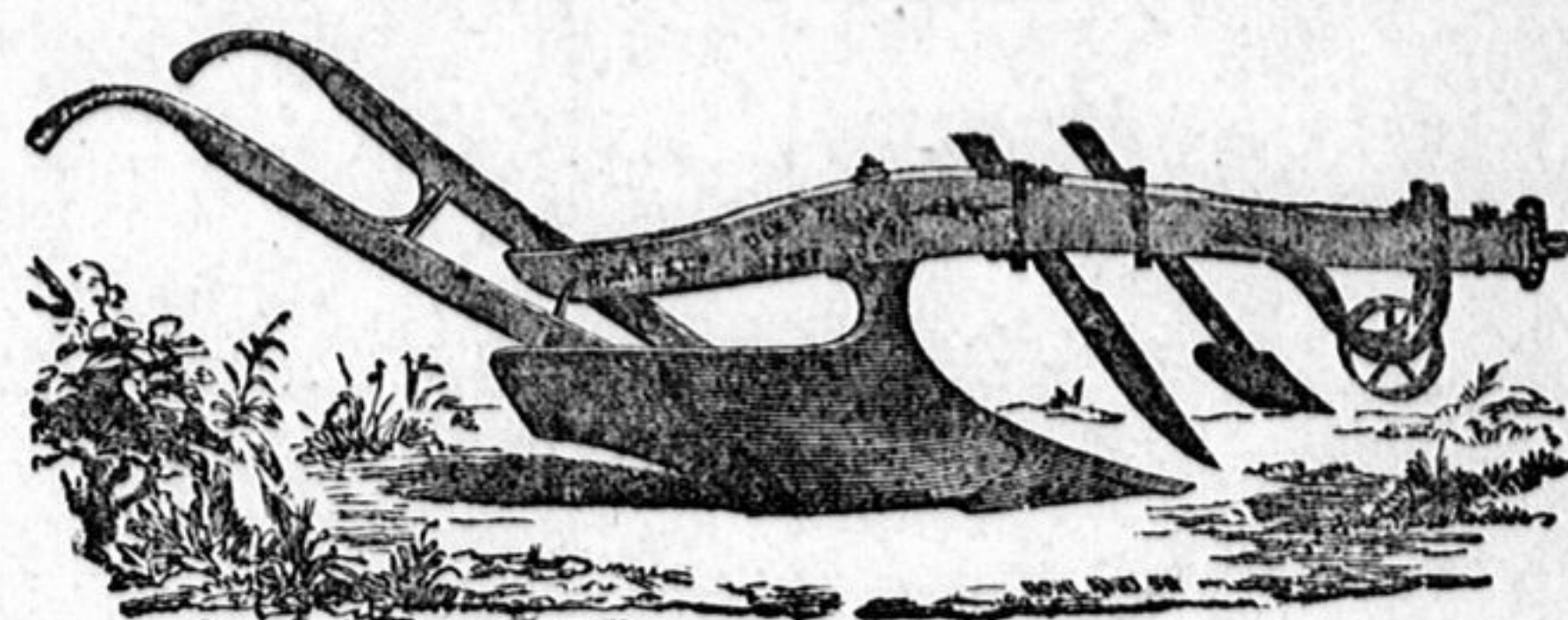
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The Drawings have been made by our designer who has a wide-spread reputation in the United States and Canada for his taste in Organ Building.
