D. AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY. FALL SHOW.

The Annual Fall Show of the above Society, was held at the village of Victoria Road, last Tuesday, and although there were not so many entries and visitors as expected, still the show was very good.

Was rather limited, but we noticed some splendid sheep, and two really fine bulls of the Durham short-horn breed, the first prize animal being a splendid beast and in perfect order.

Was very good in the various classes, a heavy draught team especially eliciting a large amount of admiration. In the exhibit was poor, both as to quantity and quality.

A large number of samples were exhibited, some of them being of very fine quality. The first prize Fall Wheat was the best sample of grain we have seen this season.

All of which were remarkable fine and of immense size. We observed some Early Rose Potatoes which we are sure could not be beaten by any exhibit in Toronto.

Were many, and in quality equally as varied. The finest specimen of the article was discovered in some "prints," which unfortunately were debarred from taking the prize, owing to not being put up in the required form—rolls.

As usual, was by far the most plentiful, a large number of handsome articles, both useful and ornamental, being exhibited. The first prize Coverlet was a handsome piece of work, and fairly deserved the award.

Was small. White & Bro., of Woodville, received first prize for Fanning Mill, of which there were three on the ground. Fred. Leas, of this place, also received the prize for Cutter, the only exhibit in that line present.
