THORAHFALLSHOW

The Annual Fall Show of the Thorah Branch Agricultural Society, was held in Beaverton, on Friday last, 3rd inst. The day was very fine and attracted a large crowd to the village. Owing to some delay in announcing the show the number of entries and exhibits were very small, scarcely half of former years, but everything on the ground was in first-class order. The exhibit of horses was very good, but there were scarcely any cattle shown and but few pens of sheep. The Grain, of which there was a fine lot shown, was splendid sample, and the judges had great difficulty in deciding to which to award the first prize. There was also a very large display of Roots-potatoes, turnips, mangolds, &c., being well represented. There was a large exhibit of Butter and Cheese, all first-class. The Cash System.—It is now pretty generally acknowledged that the Cash System is the only correct method of doing business, yet in practice it seems verry difficult to carry into operation. Last fall our merchants decided to adopt the above system, but owing to the extreme scarcity of money during the past season many of them were forced to credit again. Now that the prospects are a little better it would be well for them to again enforce the cash system, or moderate the old one in that direction, We notice by the Gleaner that "a number of the merchants of Sunderland have made a move towards the adoption of this system which is certainly to be commended. They have given notice that from the first of Octa ober to the first of March they will sell only for cash, giving credit the remainder of the year to those worthy of it."
