THE trial of Nelson Hamlin for the mnrder of Joseph Laroeque on the 4th of September, took place at the assizes in Peterboro before Judge Armour. Mr. D. W. Damble, defended the prisoner, and Mr. Ashton Fletcher, of Woodstock, appeared for the Crown. The evidence given was practically the same as that given at the coroner's inquest, and no new light whatever was thrown on the case. The judge charged for manslaughter and after being out about 45 minutes the jury returned a verdict of "guilty of manslaughter." The prisoner in reply to the usual questions stated that he had nothing to say. He was sentenced to the Kingston penitentiary for life, the utmost that the law allows for the crime. The severity of the sentence is the general talk of the town, and many think it altogether too severe.


