A Market for Beaverton

Among the many things which go to make up the prosperity of a country town in the trade of the farming community about it. Without this trade it goes without saying that but little business could be done. Every facility which is given the farmer to reach the consumer or dealer is among those things which tend to bring up the importance of the place and make it a better location for business etc. With this in view we are of the opinion that no expenditure this village could make would bring it such sure and good returns as the erection of a building and holding a regular weekly market here. It would bring the farmer from every direction to the town weekly, besides the numerous cash buyers who are always in attendance to purchase such articles as are of marketable value. It would also relieve our storekeepers from the annoyance of buying unsaleable and inferior produce and bring about a system of cash business which could not fail to have a very salutary effect on the business of the place. If the village of Sunderland can raise among its people the sum of \$5,000 for such a purpose, as we learn is being done, is it not possible for the larger and wealthier village of Beaverton to do so? Is there anything to prevent such an enterprise from being a profitable one? We do not believe there is and we feel fully satisfied that such an investment would prove of immense advantage to the town. Let the people think over this proposition for a time. We shall have more to say on this subject in the near future with a view to bringing it into practical shape, in the meantime our columns are open to those who feel interested in the matter and would like to express their opinion.
