Injured by Powder.

PORT ARTHUR, Sept. 27.—Last evening three youths, Fred Adams and Peter and Vincent Bowell, attempted to convert blasting powder into gunpowder by pounding it. Peter Bowell was doing the work and the other two gazing on. The powder exploded, injuring all three. Adams fared worst, his hands being badly burned and his eyes very much injured. He is now sightless, but there are hopes that his eyes can be saved. The clothing of Vincent Bowell caught fire, and the neighbors, coming to the rescue, tore it off him. Adams is in the hospital, and all three are progressing as well as could be expected.—Adams is a son of Mr. Robt Adams of this place [Ed.]

The Perjury Trial.

The Crown vs. McKee—Perjury—was a case tried before a bench of magistrates on Friday and Saturday last. The case arose under the recent seizure of liquor here under the Scott Act and Mr. Alex. Hamilton, who was the complainant in the case, sought to prove that the Rev. Thos. McKee had committed perjury in stating under oath that he did not know one "Hamilton Magahy." The affair seemed entirely one of wrong pronouncement and from the manner in which the name was given Mr. McKee, namely, "Mageegee," it could hardly be wondered at that he replied in the negative. The Magistrates, Messrs. Foley, Bruce, McRae and McPherson were divided and on summing up the pros. and cons., Messrs. Bruce and McPherson were for discharge and Messrs. Foley and McRae, for committal. The case consequently dropped. Considerable interest was taken in the matter from the fact that both parties to the case are closely identified with the enforcement of the Scott Act, Mr. Hamilton figuring as a very defiant violator of the law and Rev. Mr. McKee as its champion, this being so, it was considered that the case was simply one of spite and consequently the temperance people as represented by the ladies of the W. C. T. U., turned out in numbers to hear the evidence. The trial lasted close on two days and the evening session on Friday was not adjourned until 3 a. m. on Saturday morning, the court room being crowded all the time. Most of the evidence elicited was of the most trivial character.

The Fall Show.

The annual fall show of Thorah Branch Agricultural Society took place on Wednesday and Thursday. The affair was somewhat disappointing. We had expected after the very favorable results of last year, that the people would have taken hold of the matter and pushed it forward. Every chance was offered and at no time in the history of the Society did so favorable an opportunity present itself for making Thorah show one of the best in the district, but the ever present state of torpidity which seems to possess the people of this locality in all things of a public nature again vindicated itself this year and the result was that the show could hardly be considered, in many respects up to the average. It is true, the weather was not inviting, being cold and dismal, which no doubt, detained many from being present, who would otherwise have been there to swell the crowd, but this can hardly account for the beggarly display of grain which was present, only a baker's dozen of entries in all, and that in a year when, for quality, the grain product of the locality has never been better. The absence of the large display of ladies' work, of last year, was also very noticeable, although such as was shown

was of a decidedly superior character but in the kitchen department of ladies' exhibits the show was very meagre. The best feature of the hall was the noble display of roots. We do not think a better exhibit could be viewed at any of the large shows than presented itself here and considering the unfavorable nature of the season, the results are astonishing. One marigold, grown on the farm of Mr. Jno. A. Proctor, and which some parties had the curiosity to weigh, tipped the scale at fifty-one pounds and it is stated that the weight is not uncommon through the crop. All other roots and vegetables were equally as good, showing sound and clean substance. In the outside departments, the show of animals was not up to that of last year, although such as offered was of excellent quality, particularly in cattle. If the exhibit can be taken as a fair criterion, we should say the stock of this locality is rapidly improving and that in a very gratifying sense. There was a good exhibit of poultry in the various varieties, but the prizes in this department being very limited, leads largely to curtail the entries in this really interesting feature of the show. Altogether, the show of 1888, cannot be said to have been a success, and it is with regret we are forced to say it. We hoped to publish the prize list this week, but find it impossible owing to pressure of other matters previously in hand. It will appear in our next.
