

TOO VERDANT.

We refer to Mr. W. Reynolds, Conductor on the M. R. R. who "sat" on us through the columns of last week's Port Hope Times. We insert his letter, as we feel it would be an injustice to Mr. Reynolds as well as our readers, if we failed to put such a masterpiece of sarcasm. We are sure the correspondent who penned that article to the Lindsay Post, will never again attempt to remind Conductor Reynolds wherein his duty lies in regard to the lives and limbs of passengers entrusted to his care. We will only trouble Conductor Reynolds with one piece of advice: keep out of the newspapers, you are too verdant.

DEAR SIR,—please allow me space in your columns to refer to a paragraph which has appeared recently in several papers published along the line of the Midland Railway, originating, I think, with the Woodville Advocate. I can better explain this contemptible effort to injure me by copying the paragraph and running my remarks into the body of it parenthetically:—
"As the mail train, in charge of Conductor Reynolds, came up to the station, going north, Beaverton was announced by one of the officials." (The brakesman). "The train having stopped, the passengers who intended coming off, made a move to do so." (There was only one, and that one was the woman in question). "Some of them got off and others were in the act of stepping on the platform." 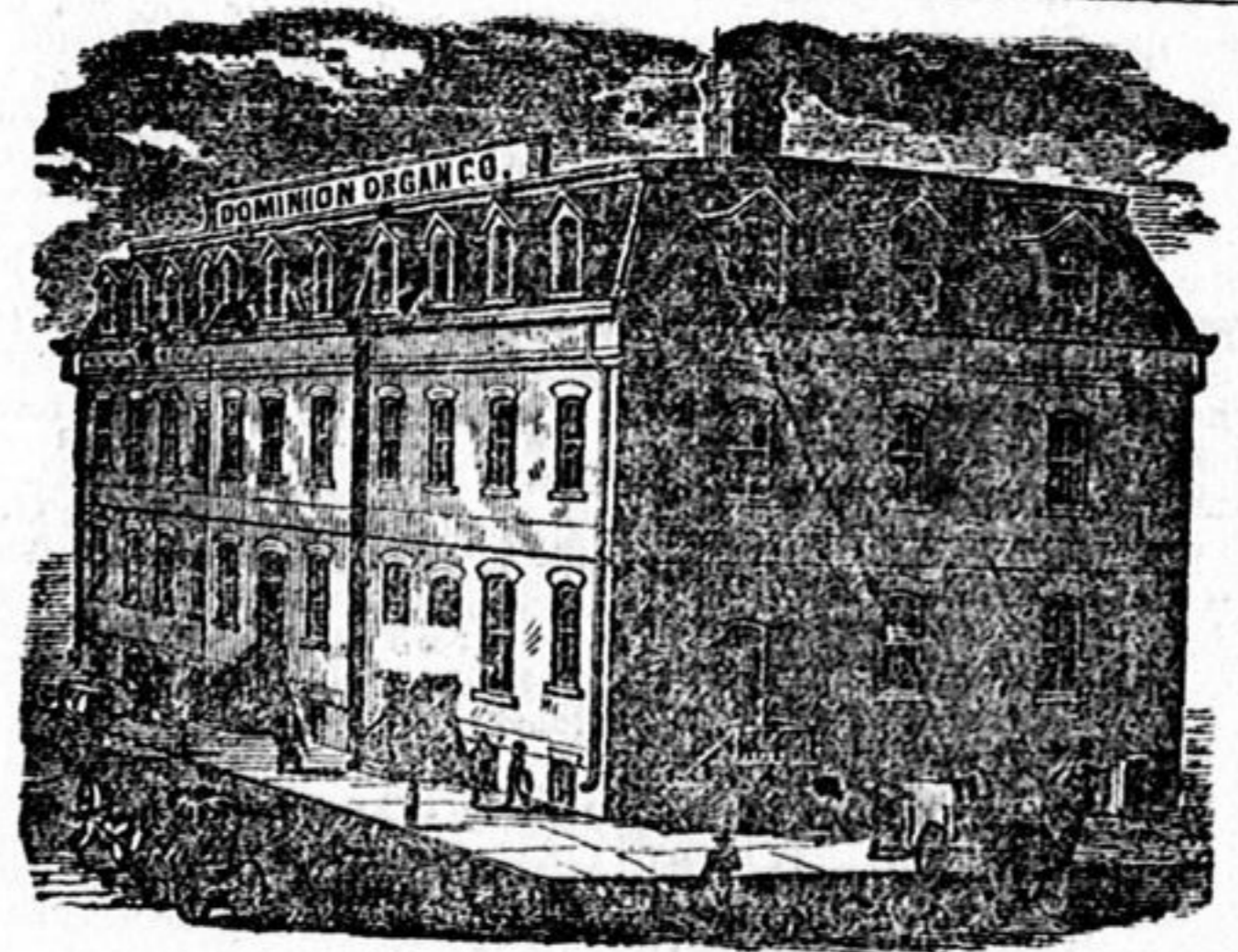
