WOODVILLE, NOV. 6, 1879.

THE unusually excellent wheat crop of this season has induced farmers in the United States to plant a larger amount of wheat than in any previous year. A report from Cincinnatti, states that the sowing of fall wheatin Southern Ohio, Illinois, and Indiana is completed. The area devoted to wheat in the two latter States being from 50 to 100 per cent, greater than any previous season. The appearance of the young grain is very promising, except in a few localities where the Hessian fly has appeared The weather has been favourable and to all appearances the wheat crop in 1880 throughout that section will be far greater than that of the present year. The present high price of wheat has induced farmers to neglect other crops in order to increase their wheat acreage. This is not a prudent line of action. The next year may not be so favorable for wheat and it is never well to put all your eggs in one basket.


