MR. GRO A. WHEELER, M. P., we understand has been given the contract for the construction of the link line between Wick, on the T. & N. R. and Manilla, on the Whitby & Port Perry Railway. It will be commenced immediately and is to be completed at an early date.

THE people of Hartley and Glenarm are still growing under the mail vexation. Surely if proper representations were made to the authorities the present anomoly would be removed. It is simply absurd-letters from here to Hartley, a distance of seven miles, taking two days, the letter having to travel to Port Hope and back before being delivered.

In the new Midland-Grand Trunk Railway Combination, to which refer ence was made in these columns a few days ago, the Victoria Railway, owned by Messrs. John Proctor and D. Me-Innes, of Hamilton will be included. The Victoria extends from Lindsay northward, and its continuation to the shore of Lake Ontario is called the Whithy and Port Perry Railway. These two roads enter the combination at a valuation of upwards of \$1,000,000. - Hamilton Times.

WHY do the people of Cambray tolerate the hovel with which the Midland Railway is pleased to accomodate that village and which is graced with the name of Cambray station. A place giving the business to the line that Cambray does certainly deserves a little more consideration than is at present bestowed upon it. Canada's Fature.

Sydney Smith, writing to the World, has the following about the future of Canala':-

We all know at what a low ebb the Mail's loyalty had fallen just anterior to the last general election. It had then in prospective a charge in our commercial and fiscal policy which it knew ito be entirely at variance with, and contrary to, the commercial policy of the mother land. But it hesitated not to sacrifice its loyalty then for the sake of obtaining place and power for its party. Can-ada first was its continuous cry. "If we succeed, so much worso for British connection." It did succeed and Canada took a long step toward commercial independence. She yet lacks the power to negotiate her own treaties of commerce with whom she may desire. England still reserves this right. But history repeats itself, and the time will come when the Mail and its party will again find themselves seeking for power and office, and in their eagerness to obtain what they seek, that ebulliency of loyalty and streaming forth will again recede and give place to the cry of independence. The nobodies which the Mail says is the only class who discuss the question of inde-pendence will be recognized by the same journals as somebodies to morrow, and Sir Alexander Galt, whom the Mail notes as saying neither annexation nor independence is a live issue in Canada, cannot certainly be relied on as an tauthority. A man of such fickleness as Alexander Galt has proved himself to be in favoring everything in turn a d but nothing long is unreliable, having no fixed opinions to guide him. As I before stated in a previous letter the best proof of the growth of national sentiment in Canada is the success of and the encouragement received by that portion of the press which advocates severance from Britain in that peaceful manner long anticipated by leading statesmen and political writers in Eng-We must study politics in the light of

history, we are told. That is just what the advocates of Canadian ind pendence have been doing, and to show their unswerving loyalty and intense love for foreign rule the people of this country have been very gradually creeping away from its influence. -So says history, dating from the year 1840, when Lord Durham wisely granted the people of this country their demands for constitutional government. We have got now to the end of the rope which we but loosely hold, and must eventually let go. There is nothing more probable under the sun. But says the Mail, if independent, the country must immediately saddle itself with military and diplomatic expenditures on an appalling scale. Why? for what reason? Have we not now enrolled the names of 600,000 fighting men, and did not Sir John Macdonald but a few months since, when in England, boast of having at command at a few hours' call an army of 40,000 men always at the service of the crown?' Why, then, any further expense if in business for ourselves? And as to the diplomatic expense, should we not be as well able to bear up under its enormous weight as other a.d smaller nations are ?- Would not the advantage of being represented throughout the world more than counterbalance the cost? our interest would then be attended to abroad, which is not now the case, nor ever has been. England's representatives do not in any sense represent Canada, nor care two straws for her commercial welfare. In every disputed case between ngland and the United States Canada's interest has been made to suffer; and there exists in England at the present time, according to the press of the country, such an overwhelming desire to keep on good terms with the United States, that rather than lose their friendship England would make great sacrifices in other directions. Therefore Canada's only chance of safety lies in her hasty severance from that country, which exhibits too much more respect for the neighboring republic and its interests than for that of Canada. We are studying politics in the light of Mistory when we say that Canada's interest has never been favorably considered by Great Britain; that our prospects of a fathre intional existence, or of closer commercial relationship with that country is not likely to become brighter or strengthe ed by delay. Independence alone can save u from having our interest further sacriffeed by Great Britain and from annexation to the United States. Mr. Smith has made a grave mistake, at
