Carried.

Moved by Mr. Broad, seconded by Mr. Lownsbrough, that the Reeve give his order on the Treasurer in favor of the following intelligent persons: Mary Harder in care of T. Broad, \$3.00; Mrs. Swetland in care of R. P. Butler, \$3.00; Blew's family in care of A. Cameron, \$4.00. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bowes, seconded by Mr. Lownsbrough, that the following accounts be paid, and that the Reeve give his order on the Treasurer for the same: Dr. E. Vrooman for medicine to John Kennedy, \$11.00; R. W. Ronch, expenses of the late J. Kennedy in care of T. Broad, 75 cents; R. Smith, opening drain, etc., in Little Britain, \$7.00; N. Ue & Co., per account, \$4.00. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Broad, seconded by Mr. Lownsbrough, that this council now adjourn to meet again on the 1st Monday in December next. Carried.
