PORT HOPE.

MAINTENANCE COALS.—We have at our office for the inspection of the curious, several samples of Manitoba coal just as it is taken from the surface. It is a bituminous coal and burns quite freely. The samples before us came from the Snowden settlement, from the farm of Mr. John Hayden, son of Mr. T. Hayden.

A FEARFUL STORM.—The storm that commenced to rage on the lake at an early hour on Saturday was the most severe of any this season. The Port Hope fleet was known to be on the lake somewhere between Oswego and this port, which occasioned considerable alarm among those having friends on board. Some three or four of the fleet arrived in the morning in the midst of the very wildest of the storm. One of them (the Great Western) coming in, struck the west pier and was slightly damaged.

A CLOSE CALL.—The schooner Twilight had a narrow escape from going ashore last week. She was laden with coal from Oswego to Toronto and attempted to make this harbor, but the captain seemed not to have known the position of the bar at the mouth of the harbor, and in making port she struck on the bar and drifted toward the east pier. She dropped her anchor and with a heavy sea until daylight next morning, when the tug A. H. Wright went to her assistance and brought her safely into port. The only damage sustained was the drifting of her mainmast.

FROM AN ACCIDENT.—Some two weeks ago a gentleman living on Port Street in a house adjoining the residence of J. M. B. found down stairs and injured his head. Medical aid was obtained; but it seems the injury was of an internal nature, and his eyes set in. On Sunday a consultation was held, but no relief could be given to the sufferer. Death took place Monday, and death followed at 7 o'clock next morning. The name of the deceased gentleman was Arthur Thayer, son of the late Hon. Arthur Thayer, near London, Eng. It is supposed to have been a resident of Port Hope for five or six weeks.

A YOUNG MAN about 17 years of age, named Wm. Middleton, the only son of Mrs. Thomas Middleton, lot 4th, 5th and 6th, who has been employed for a few weeks as a brakeman on the Grand Trunk Railway, was killed on Monday night. As the train on which he was working was near the Scarborough station, about 9 o'clock, he fell from the top of a freight car. In the fall he broke his skull, and when picked up was quite dead. His mother is frantic with grief at the loss of her only child. The funeral will be held on the 21st of the month. The whole community in this hour of her sore affliction.

WHITBY.

AN ACCIDENT occurred on the W. P. & T. Railway, on Monday last, by which Mr. Charles Caldwell, a brakeman, received a fatal wound. While in the act of coupling the cars between the Whitby station and the Grand Trunk Junction, his left arm was accidentally caught between the iron rods, and received a severe laceration between the wrist and elbow. Fortunately there were no bones broken, and it is hoped that it will not amount to more than a temporary wound.

ON SUNDAY afternoon last Mr. Thomas Cooper, of Barton, while leaning over a horse was kicked in the left side of the head, causing him to fall and sustain a very severe laceration of the left ear, which completely cut him from the brain. He was in the act of passing behind the horse at the time, and being placed shortly afterwards search was made and he was found lying in an unconscious state and was carefully removed to the house. Dr. W. A. Ross, of Barton, was called in and he sent for Dr. Farnsworth, of Oshawa, but up to a late hour yesterday little hope was held forth for the recovery of the injured man. He is upwards of seventy six years old, and on the day of this accident was hale and hearty.

GRILLIA.

AN IMPROVEMENT in the way of a platform at the north end of the Midland station has been made. The convenience and comfort it affords in this season of mud will over balance the expense.

A CARPENTER named Thomas Wilson working at the old Midland station yesterday while using the axe cut off his big toe or the biggest part of it. He was at once taken to Macmillan's and external and internal remedies were immediately applied. He expects to be able soon to resume work.

CRUELTY.—One day last week a farmer drove into the village and after indulging in "rangleleg" to a high degree, performed some antics on the streets with a horse and buggy. KICKED BY A HORSE.—On Wednesday morning early, Mr. James Johnston, who lives a short distance north of Omemee, was severely kicked while attending his horses. Dr. Norris, who was promptly sent for tells us that four ribs were broken, a bad cut inflicted on the side of the head and the left hand and shoulder were badly bruised. Mr. Johnston will no doubt be confined to the house for some time.

FINGERS CUT OFF.—On Wednesday afternoon a boy named Harry Sisley, had the misfortune to have the three front fingers of his left hand cut off while working a dye in the tinshop of Mr. G. H. Peilbar.

COLLAPSED.—The early closing movement among our merchants has nearly collapsed, some of them now keep their stores open until seven o'clock, and there is considerable jumbling among the clerks in consequence.

SALE OF REAL ESTATE.—Mr. Wm. Glenney, of Oshawa, has purchased from Messrs. Methersall & Soper, and Mr. Jas. Wellington, the north halves of lots 14 and 15 in the 3rd concession of Mariposa (the old Yew farm) at sixty-seven dollars and fifty cents per acre. The farm is one of the best in the neighborhood. Mr. Glenney will place his son on it.

CHOKED TO DEATH.—A very melancholy accident occurred in the township of Pickering, on Tuesday last, resulting in the death of a young woman named McIntosh, about twenty years of age. She resided with her uncle, Mr. James Palmer, lot No. 31, in the 2nd Con. It appears that she has been in the habit of getting behind a roller towel and throwing it over her head, and must have been committing the same act at the time of the accident. It is supposed she slipped and fell and was strangled to death. She was found and dead by her uncle when he went to dinner.

ROBBERY.—On Friday last some person or persons burglarized the dry goods store of Mr. W. M. Wightman, Oshawa. The burglars first broke open the door of Mr. Meavens' iron warehouse, and procured a bar of iron which they brought into use in prying up the back window of the store, thus gaining an entrance. Upon examination it was discovered that a quantity of jewelry and a number of silk pocket handkerchiefs had been stolen. The Chief Constable was at once notified and took every means possible to catch the thieves, but up to the present time his efforts have been unavailing. Two suspicious looking characters were in the store enquiring for boots, and it is thought they are the guilty parties.

HOUSE SKEWING.—On Wednesday evening a man named John Hall, of the township of East Whitley, was caught in the act of stealing a horse and buggy belonging to Mr. J. S. Gould, from the Queen's Hotel sheds. He was somewhat under the influence of liquor, and in consequence no steps were taken to punish him. He afterwards made an attempt to steal Mr. Andrews' horse and buggy, and was caught in the act but let go. Later in the evening he was again seen taking a horse and buggy belonging to Mr. Knott, from the same sheds, and his manoeuvres becoming too common, a constable was sent for, but before the official arrived, Hall made his escape. The practice of taking rigs from the hotel sheds is becoming quite a common occurrence, and should be put a stop to.

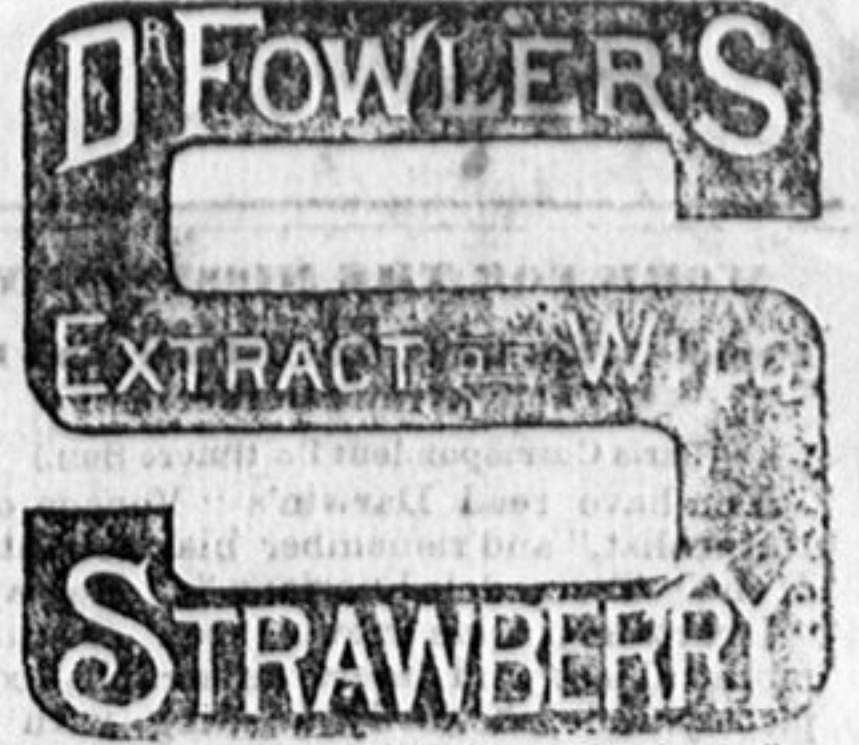
