

Editorial Motes.

A BANQUET was given on the evening of Friday of last week, at Fenelon Falls, to Mr. Hector Cameron, M. P., on the occasion of inauguration of work on the Trent Valley Canal. We have heretofore been somewhat dubious as to the intentions of the Government in the work, and regarded the matter simply as an election dodge. It is evident. however, that we have beer mistaken, and we may say agreeably so. There is no scheme that can promote the interests of this locality more than the construction of this canal, and we extend to Mr. Cameron and those gentlemen who have interested themselves in the matter, the thanks of the people of this section.

THE much debated question of the aboli tion of the union between Church and State is now becoming a matter of intense interest in England, and is fast being forced into the field of "practical politics," The frequent recurrence of sales by auction of farm tools, implements, and utensils under distraint to recover the extraordinary tithes claimed by the Established Church under a law long supposed to be obsolete causes the utmost mdignation among English farmers, and numerous meetings are being held to consider the question. Now that the Egyptian question is "off the boards," Mr. Gladstone will devote himself to home politics, and among the first measures to receive his attion we would not be surprised to see "Severance of Church and State."

CHRISTIANITY, as Macaulay complained, - hardly gets fair play in India to this day. When the three members of the Salvation Army were arrested in the streets of Bombay, they were simply marching through the streets with a banner and singing hymns as they went. They were followed by a crowd of curious natives, which was, of course, the very thing they desired, as they wanted an audience to preach to, but there were no signs that a breach of the peace was at all probable. Yet it was on a charge of forming an assembly which was likely to lead to a breach of the peace that they were brought to trial. A fourth member of the corps who preached in the hall secured by the army to an audience so large that as many stood without as within, stated that on his way to the meeting-house he had passed two native religious processions, both of which were protected by policemen. and Hindoos as if the British Government or to L. C. GILCHRIST, Esq., had less respect for the Christian religion than for that either of Mohammed or Buddha.

A DEPUTATION of clergymen and others representing three of the toremost Protestant bodies in the Province, waited on Premier Mowat on Tuesday of last week, to urge the necessity of making the study of the Rible in our Public Schools compulsory. Numerous arguments were advanced as reasons why this should be. Mr. Mowat gave rather an evasive reply to the deputation, and asked time to consider the matter. We cannot but think that with nearly seven-eighths of our schools already using the Bible daily it would be insulting to the intelligence of the teacher to render compulsory what has been performed voluntarily, while to the reminder, who may possibly act from conscientious scruples, compulsion in the matter would be simply tyranny. We observe that one of the speakers assumes that a secular education is not accompanied by a moral tendency. In fact we are given to understand that it rather fits for a higher grade of villainy than can pertain to the illiterate. This is hardly consistent with facts, although the rev. gentleman produces statistics from the Governor of Massachusetts to prove the assertion. We would certainly deprecate the absence of religious instructions from the schools, but believe that that which is done voluntarily is done conscientiously and of much more efficacy than can ever be produced by compulsion.
