TOWNSHIP OF BEXLEY
BY-LAW NO.—

A BY-LAW TO STOP UP THE ROAD ALLOWANCE BETWEEN
LOTS 20 AND 21, N. W. COR., BEXLEY, FROM THE
LAKE SHORE ROAD TO THE BASE LINE.

WHEREAS A ROAD HAS BEEN
opened on the North-East side of Lot 18, N.
W. COR., from Lake Shore Road to Base Line, in lieu
of the original allowance for road between Lots 20
and 21 of the same range, thereby rendering the
road between said Lots 20 and 21, unnecessary for
public use.

It is hereby enacted by the Municipal Council of
the Township of Bexley that the original road al-
lowance between Lots 20 and 21, N. W. R., in the
Township of Bexley, is hereby closed up.

cipal Council of the Township of Bexley, County of
Victoria, on the 25th day of November next, at the

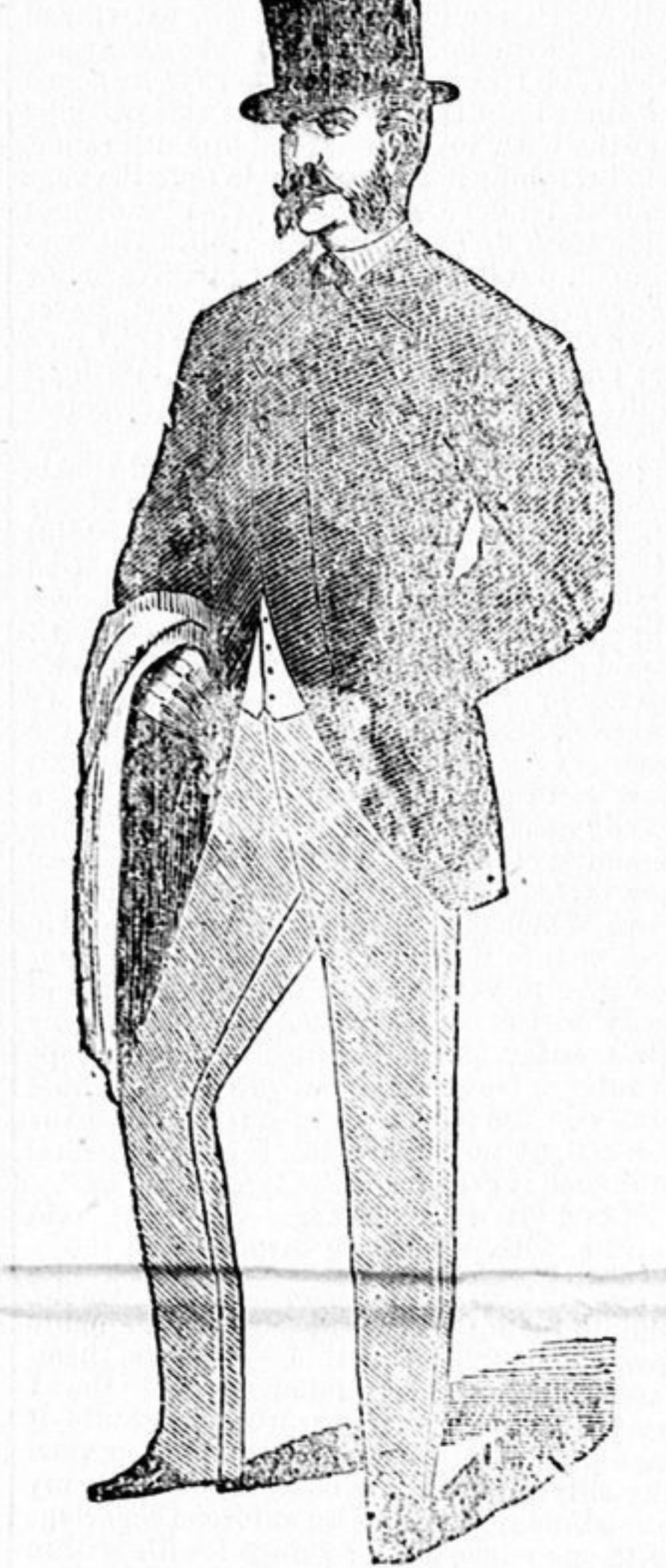
