The great comet presented a fine appearance Monday morning. Its increasing distance from us has not greatly effected the brightness of the tail, and the apparent magnitude of the comet is not so greatly diminished as one might expect. The nucleus appears quite dim. Telescopic study is difficult on this account. The comet's position in the sky has changed but little for two or three weeks. This indicates that it is moving almost directly away from us. It may yet disappoint the commentators of its orbit and remain in sight until it turns again for another journey to the sun. Such an event would create a pronounced sensation in the astronomical world.

## TOWNSHIP OF BEXLEY BY-LAW NO.—

A BY-LAW TO STOP UP THE ROAD ALLOWANCE BETWEEN LOTS 20 AND 21, N. W. B. CON., BEXLEY, FROM THE LAKE SHORE ROAD TO THE BASE LINE.

WHEREAS A ROAD HAS BEEN opened on the North-East side of Lot 18, N. W. B. Con. from Lake Shore Road to Base Line, in lieu of the original allowance for road between Lots 20 and 21 of the same range, thereby rendering the road between said Lots 20 and 21, unnecessary for public use.

It is hereby enacted by the Municipal Council of the Township of Bexley that the original road allowance between Lots 20 and 21, N. W. B. Con., in the Township of Bexley, is hereby closed up.
