OUR NEIGHBORS.

PENETANGUISHENE.

NAVIGATION.—The schooner, "Victor," has been purchased by Mr. Bech, of this town.....The "Maxwell" now makes the trip to Parry Sound on alternate days.....The "Cruiser," a government vessel looking after the fisheries of the Georgian Bay, will winter at Collingwood.....The "Marquis" and "Severn" left last week for Chicago with cedar blocks for paving.

HUNTING.—Hardly a day passes, but a number of sportsmen pass through town for the north shore to hunt.

THE ESPLANADE.—The contract for building an esplanade at Penetang, has been let to Mr. Burdette, of Collingwood. The cost is to be \$40,000.

BROKEN LEG.—While some boys were playing at the public school, one fell off a picket fence, catching his foot between two pickets and breaking his leg. Boys will climb.

GOVERNMENT GRANTS.—The Indians on Christian Islands received their government allowance last week.

Here and There.

Hastings sports a new fire engine.

A bear weighing 400 pounds was caught in a trap at Duck Bay, near Waubesaucene, last week.

Acton passed a by-law on the 22nd ult. to bonus the McGarvin Trunk Manufacturing Co.

Milton has waterworks and now it wants a \$100 fire alarm system.

A by-law granting a bonus of \$25,000 to a paper mill company was carried in Morrisburg on Saturday.

St. Thomas took in nearly \$2,400 last week for Scott Act fines and costs.

Wingham by large majorities has voted in favor of three bonus by-laws to aid furniture factories.

The Gravenhurst tax rate this year is 36 mills on the dollar.

Judge McCurry is just now doing the division court work on the Manitoulin Island.

The work of deepening and improving the South Channel in the Georgian Bay is finished.

It is estimated that the new dry dock at Kingston will cost \$600,000.

A petition was filed at Osgoode Hall, on Saturday, against the return of Mr. John Waldie, M. P., for Halton.

About 30 bears have been killed in the neighbourhood of Huntsville in two weeks, weighing 700 pounds on an average.

According to Mr. E. Phelan, who returned from Ottawa a few days ago, the Farley case was settled at a Cabinet meeting which was held on Saturday the 20th ult. It is probable the result will be known in a day or two.

At about 11:30 p. m. on the 20th ult., Mr. Alex. Oxtoby's barn and outbuildings near Udonia were burned to the ground. In the barn was all of this year's grain, five valuable horses and a threshing machine belonging to Messrs. Moore and Scott of Udonia, and in the outbuildings were eleven pigs, all of which were consumed. The fire is supposed to have originated from some flying sparks from the threshing engine. Mr. Oxtoby's loss is estimated at \$3,000 with only \$200 insurance. Messrs. Moore & Scott's loss on separator is \$500 with no insurance.

The steamer "Magnetawan" while entering port at Waubesaucene, struck a rock, and lost one of the flanges of her propeller. She was returning from Owen Sound where she had been dry-docked for repairs. The old sailors say the "Mag" had better go to Owen Sound and camp there for good, for she can't make a better record than this. She is now doing her best to float around with only three flanges to her propeller wheel, and left on Tuesday with a cargo of live stock and other supplies for Byng Inlet, experiencing considerable difficulty in leaving the dock, however.

The new bridge over the Otomabee river near the locks is now completed. The bridge is of iron and was manufactured by the Central Iron Bridge Works of Peterborough. The structure is a very fine one, the parts strong and the bolting and riveting substantial, a credit to Mr. W. H. Law, the head of the firm, who designed it. The span is 190 feet long and the roadway measures 18 feet clear. The masonry of the piers was well done and they seem substantial. We understand that an improper connection was made with the old swing, and also that it was no fault of the builders of the bridge. Travel commenced over it on Wednesday when it was opened to the public.

Typhoid fever is prevailing to an alarming extent at Essex Centre.

Sutton and vicinity is greatly excited over a number of small pox cases, which have been found there. The direful malady, it appears, was introduced by a thresher who in visiting the various houses left the horrible taint after him.

Mr. L. McMurray, of Gladstone, has a pumpkin vine which is 35 feet long and produced 51 pumpkins, the largest measuring 4 feet, 11 inches in circumference.

On Wednesday of last week Lakefield voted on a ten thousand dollar by-law for fire protection.

Beechnuts are very plentiful this fall, which is said to be a forerunner of a bitterly cold and stormy winter.

It is rumored that Sir John Macdonald will proceed to England shortly to have a consultation with members of the Imperial Government on the fishery question.

Rev. W. Briden, who was pastor of the Omecme circuit thirty-three years ago, preached in the Methodist church, Omecme, on Sunday evening, the 21st ult., and was greeted by a crowded house.

About one thousand geese were shipped from Campbellford one day last week.

Twenty members of the Salvation Army have volunteered to go as missionaries to India, and left on Tuesday last from Toronto. They were all dressed in the costume of the natives of India, and presented a novel appearance.

The Bowmanville Curling and Skating Riak, and a barn owned by Capt. R. T. Raynes, were burned down between 11 and 12 o'clock on Monday night. The rink cost nearly \$4,000, but was insured for only \$2,500. Most of the town curlers lost their stones. Fire bugs are suspected.

James Quinn, a son of Mr. James Quinn, of Orillia, was drowned on the Georgian Bay while returning home from hunting on Friday last. A storm arose, the canoe upset and the dogs which were in it, clawed the young man until he sank.

The county of Peterborough has closed the Pigeon Creek bridge by placing two large stones at the approaches, because Victoria county refuses to assist in its maintenance.

Hunting in the Haliburton district is said to be excellent this year. One party reports four deer and two bears as the result of the first days hunt. Moose were also seen. Wolves killed all their hounds.

Farmers in the neighborhood of Acton have suffered financially at the hands of some Yankee sharpers. The 'crooks' sold implements and gave time for part of the amount. When the papers mature, a duplicate is presented, the signature forged, and the money drawn. The true note has been discounted and when the three days grace are up, payment demanded on it as well. Farmers patronize home dealers and thus avoid annoyance.

A terrible railway accident occurred on the Lehigh Valley railway last week. An excursion train, crowded with people was divided into eight sections and the eighth section ran into the seventh section. There was a frightful crash when the engine plunged her full length into the crowded mass of humanity. The shock drove the rear car through the next one for two-thirds of its length and the second car was forced into the third. Not a single person escaped from the rear car. The second was crowded with maimed and bleeding bodies and the third car had but few passengers, who escaped. A large number were terribly injured, many of whom cannot recover. Already the list of dead numbers sixty-one and the surgeons at the Wilkesbarre hospital say that half a dozen of their patients will die. The disaster makes 15 widows and 34 orphans. It is estimated that the accident will cost the Lehigh Valley Railway Company half a million dollars to settle with the relatives of the dead and injured.
