Manitoba and the C.

THINGS are in a bad shape just now in Manitoba. The Province is on the verge of a rebellion it appears and all through the C. P. R. again, The Provincial government has had under its wing a new railway which was to connect with the American system of roads and thus put an end to the unbearable monopoly which the C. P. R. has imposed on the country. This new road has met with the greatest opposition from the C. P. R. as was to be expected and last year the disa'lowances by the Federal governne t of the Legislative Acts under which the road was being constructed led almost to an outbreak, the trouble was averted, however by the Dominion government paying the sum of \$15,000,000 to annul the C. P. R. monopoly rights. This it was thought would end the trouble but not so. The C. P. R. having got its money still seeks to prevent the construction and operation of the new road and by one quibble and another has succeeded. The latest phase of the trouble has been brought to the front in the C. P. R., refusing the new road the right to cross its track and the rival companies almost came to blows on Friday when the C. P. R., had upwards of a thousand men in position to resist the crossing, which the people of Manitoba declared should be made. Wise counsels prevailed, however, and the peace was maintained, while application was made to the court for an opinion on the injunction, which the C. P. R. had obtained to prevent the crossing. Judgment was given on Monday last in favor of the C. P. R., and there the matter stands. After the Dominion paying \$15,000,000 to help Manitoba out of the difficulty with the C. P. P., the situation is found bad as ever and the people of Manitoba will still have to hear with the lamentable infliction of railway monopoly. It is hard to say where the matter will end. The people of the prairie province are completely aroused and declare they will have their ranroad at once while the C. P. R. are as firmly resolved to resist.




