Beaverton Village Fathers.

September 5th, 1888. The council met as adjourned. Present, the Reeve, and Councillors Treleaven and Westcott. Minutes of last meeting read and adopted. Application for collector received from J. C. Edgar. Moved by Mr. Treleaven, seconded by Mr. Westcott, that the collector be not appointed until next meeting.—Carried. Mr. Treleaven gave notice that he will at next meeting move for the appointment of a committee to take steps necessary to provide burial accommodation so as to prevent any future interments within the corporation limits. The account of Hart & Co. stationery re. debenture by-law election was presented and ordered to be paid. On motion the council adjourned to meet on Wednesday, September 26th at 7 o'clock p. m.

September 26th, 1888. The council met as adjourned. Moved by Mr. Westcott, seconded by Mr. Campbell, that Mr. George Smith, sr., act as clerk, pro. tem.—Carried. Present, the Reeve and Councillors Young, Westcott and Campbell. Mr. Treleaven taking his seat towards the close of the meeting. The minutes of last meeting read and adopted. The report of the clerk in the matter of the poll on by-law No. 9 of 1888, as follows, was read:

TO THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE VILLAGE OF BEAVERTON, IN COUNCIL ASSEMBLED:

Your clerk and returning officer appointed to hold a poll on By-law, No. 9, of 1888, entitled a By-law to provide for the issue of debentures to the amount of \$2,000 to raise the necessary funds for granting aid by way of bonus for rebuilding and re-establishing the Beaverton Foundry, which said poll was held in the Town Hall in Beaverton, on Monday, the 10th day of September, A. D. 1888, between the hours of 9 o'clock, a. m. and 5 o'clock, p. m. of that date, hereby reports and states as follows: That the said poll showed one hundred and thirty votes marked for the By-law; That the said poll also showed nine votes marked against the By-law, and therefore that a majority of the municipal electors of the Village of Beaverton have approved of the By-law. Your clerk is also required by the Revised Statutes of Ontario, of 1887, Chap. 184, Section 320, Sub. Section 2, and by the amendments to the said statute further to certify that by the voters list of the village of Beaverton of the year 1887, as finally revised and corrected by the Judge of the County Court of Ontario, which voters' lists were used at the said poll, two hundred and fourteen electors appear to be entitled to vote at Municipal elections. That from the ballots counted at the said poll one hundred and thirty Municipal electors voted for the By-law and your clerk therefore hereby certifies that more than two-fifths of the Municipal electors as shown by the said voters' lists have voted for the By-law.

By-law No. 9 of 1888 be adopted and that the said By-law be now read the second time.—Carried. By-law read Moved by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Westcott, that By-law No. 9 of 1888 be now read the third time and passed, that the Reeve do sign the same and cause the seal of the corporation to be affixed thereto.—Carried. By-law read third time and passed. Moved by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Campbell that the Council do meet as a committee of the whole to confer with Mr. Smith as to the condition and terms of the agreement upon which the bonus is to be given for rebuilding and re-establishing the Beaverton Foundry and that the said committee do meet as soon as possible.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Westcott, that a By-law be now introduced to appoint a collector.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Westcott that By-law No. 10 of 1888 be now read and passed, and that the Reeve do sign the same and cause the seal of the corporation to be affixed thereto.—Carried. A number of accounts were then presented and ordered to be paid. Moved by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Westcott that the commissioner be instructed to expend \$10 in turpining and travelling on Victoria street west from White's opposite Mr. Brown's.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Campbell that the collector do furnish security satisfactory to the Reeve and that his bond be laid before the next meeting of Council for confirmation.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Campbell that the council do now adjourn to meet on October 27th, at 8:30 p. m.—Carried.

October 27th, 1888. The council met as adjourned from last meeting. Present

the Reeve and councillors Young, Westcott and Treleaven. Minutes of last meeting read and adopted. Communication read from John Hodgson re. condition of street in front of his store, and from Wm. Noxon re. debenture offers. The collector's bond was laid on the table when it was moved by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Westcott that the said bond be approved of and accepted by this council as satisfactory.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Westcott, seconded by Mr. Young that the clerk be instructed to prepare debentures necessary to carry out the purpose of By-law No. 9 of 1888 and have them duly advertised by insertion in the "Daily Globe" and "Empire" for two successive Saturdays.—Moved by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Treleaven that \$10 be granted to Mrs. Hare as compensation for her care of Andrew Anderson for some time past.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Treleaven that the Reeve be authorized to take steps necessary to provide for the care of Andrew Anderson an indigent, for the present and if possible to provide for his admission to the Home for Incurables.—Carried. The following accounts were presented: Hall and Hayes, a commission upon the negotiation of village debentures, \$28; the clerk preparing By-law No. 9 for registration and fees paid thereon, \$5. After considerable discussion and hearing Mr. Hayes in explanation of his account it was moved by Mr. Westcott, seconded by Mr. Treleaven that Messrs. Hall and Hayes be allowed \$20 and that the account of the clerk be paid.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Treleaven, seconded by Mr. Westcott that the commissioner be instructed to do any drainage or repairs to the street in front of the Cameron Block as may seem to him necessary.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Treleaven, seconded by Mr. Westcott that this council adjourn to meet in four weeks from this evening at 7 o'clock, p. m.—Carried.

Thorah Township Council.

Saturday October 6th, 1888. Council met at 1 o'clock p. m. All present. Minutes at the last council read and approved. Claims for sheep killed by dogs: James Gordon, 2 ewe lambs valued at \$4.50 each, allowed \$6.00; Duncan Morrison, 1 ewe and 1 lamb valued at \$10.75, allowed \$5.87; Peter McCuaig, 6 ewes valued at \$36.00, allowed \$24.00; Duncan Gillespie, 1 ewe, \$3.33; Edwin Butcher, 2 lambs, \$4.00; William Gibbs, 1 ewe and lamb, \$5.33; Peter Walls, 1 ewe lamb, \$4; John Veale, 1 lamb, \$2; Geo. Martin, 2 ewes, \$5.33; John Ritchie, 2 ewes, \$8; John Sutor, 1 ewe, \$4; Wm. Smith, 1 lamb, \$2. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Morrison, that the above amounts allowed on claims for sheep killed by dogs, be paid.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Donald A. Brown, seconded by Mr. Morrison, that Mr. Theophilus Shire, pathmaster, div. 9, be instructed to remove all obstructions from the side road between lots 20 and 21, in the 1st con. and report to the council any persons placing obstructions upon the same road.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Morrison, in the matter of the claim for compensation for the land taken for a road on lot 5, in the 1st con., through a certain part of what is known as the Mercer estate, that whereas it appears that Mr. Donald McRae had not title to the said land when the road was established in 1877, be it therefore resolved that his claim for compensation cannot be allowed.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Morrison, seconded by Mr. Galloway, that Messrs. John Smith, David Ryckman and John Fountain, be notified to remove their fences from the road between cons. 6 and 7, at lots 8, 9 and 10 and that the said fences be removed before the 1st day of January 1889.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Fraser, seconded by Mr. Morrison, that the sum of Five Dollars be paid to Mr. Charles Galloway, for the use of Mr. Ewen McPherson.—Carried. A number of accounts were then presented and ordered to be paid. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Morrison, in the matter of the allowance for road between cons. 8 and 9, at lots 1, 2 and 3, that whereas a road purporting to be the allowance for road between cons. 8 and 9, at lots 1, 2 and 3 has been partially opened, and whereas, by a survey lately made, the road so partially opened is stated to be incorrectly located and it should connect with the townline of Eldon about seven rods south of the present connection, and whereas Mr. Gamaliel Hicks, on lot 2, con. 8, is dissatisfied with the location of the said road allowance as shown by the said surveyor's report and contends for the connection of the road partially opened, be it therefore resolved that the following proposition be made to Mr. Hicks:—1st, that there be a surveyor's arbitration in the matter; 2nd, that the corporation do nominate and appoint Mr. Allan Cayana, of Brechin to act on

their behalf; 3rd, that Mr. Hicks, be requested to appoint a surveyor to act for him; 4th, that the said surveyors so appointed shall have the right to appoint a third surveyor in case of disagreements; 5th, that both parties be bound to accept the award of the said award of the said surveyors in any two of them without appeal; 6th, that the party shewn to be wrong do pay all costs; 7th, that Mr. Hicks do give security to the amount of \$100, to satisfy the said costs provided the said arbitration goes against him, be it further resolved that if Mr. Hicks shall decline or shall neglect to accept this proposal and shall fail to carry out the arrangements necessary for the said arbitration for the space of thirty days from the date of this meeting of council, then and in that case he be and is hereby notified that this council will at a meeting of the same to be held in the town hall at Beaverton on Saturday the 17th day of December, A. D. 1888, at the hour of 1 o'clock p. m., pass a by-law to open the said allowance for road between cons. 8 and 9, at lots 1, 2 and 3, on the section shown by said surveyor's report, that a copy of this resolution be served on Mr. Hicks as soon as possible. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Morrison, that this council do now adjourn to meet on Saturday, December 17th 1888, at 1 o'clock p. m.—Carried.

SPECIAL MEETING.

October 31st 1888. All present. Communications from Messrs. MacGillivray and Chapell, of Uxbridge, in the matter of the ditch on the allowance for road between cons. 6 and 7, at lot 9, also communication from Mr. Gamaliel Hicks in the matter of the allowance for road between cons. 8 and 9, at lots 1, 2 and 3, read. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Morrison, that the road commissioner and Mr. William Fraser be instructed to examine the fences and ditch between cons. 6 and 7, at lots 9 and 10 and report to this council at the next session, what, if any repairs are needed to the said ditch to carry the water from Mr. Fountain's gate to a sufficient outfall and whether the said fences are on the road allowance.—Carried. A number of accounts were then presented and ordered to be paid. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Brown, that the council do now adjourn to meet on Saturday November 3rd 1888, at 5 o'clock p. m.—Carried.

November 3rd 1888. Council met at 5 o'clock p. m. Members all present. Report of road commissioner in the matter of the ditch and fences on the allowance for road between cons. 6 and 7, at lots 9 and 10, put in and read. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Morrison, that the report of the road commissioner now read, be adopted, that this council consider there is no cause for any action on their part for repairing the ditch at lot 9, between cons. 6 and 7 beyond notifying Mr. John Fountain, and he is hereby notified, as pathmaster of Div. No. 25, to clear out any obstructions that may have fallen into the said ditch and also to remove any logs or rubbish likely to fall into the said ditch and obstruct the same, and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Mr. Fountain as soon as possible.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Fraser, that George Smith jr., P. L. S., be, and is hereby instructed to proceed to the line of road between cons. 3 and 9, at lots 1, 2 and 3 and take all the evidence available as to the current location of the said road.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Fraser, that the council do now adjourn until Saturday, December 17th, 1888. GEO. SMITH, Sr., Twp. Clerk.
