Presidential Election.

The Presidential election in the United States, resulted in the election of General Harrison, to the Presidency, thus bringing the Republican party again into power. This event puts an end to Commercial Union with Canada for some time as a possible issue.

Here and There.

Port Hope has made arrangements for the removal to that town of the Outram file factory from Montreal.

Orillia people expect an appropriation for post office and customs house when the Dominion parliament meets.

At half-past seven on Friday evening fire was discovered in Mr. Isaac Cockburn's saw mill, situated in Muskoka bay, and before anything could be done the whole mill was enveloped in flames and entirely consumed. The loss is about \$20,000, partly covered by insurance. About 60 men are thrown out of employment.

W. W. Hall, of Guelph, has fallen heir to a fortune which yields him \$50,000 a year and the interest on \$1,000,000.

The gas well at Thorold is now down 1,800 feet and the engineer says there are indications that gas will be struck at the depth of 2,400 feet.

A company has offered to start a glass works at Napanee to employ 500 men on condition of a free site, exemption for ten years and a loan of \$10,000.

The Markham village by-law to raise \$7,500 for water works was carried on Saturday by a majority of 21.

The sentence of death passed on Farley for the murder of an Indian named Elijah, at Peterborough, has been commuted to imprisonment for life.

The Reeves of Georgia and East Gwillimbury have issued their proclamations compelling the people to become vaccinated, the small pox in North Gwillimbury, being the cause of the urgency of the orders.

Artesian wells in Newmarket supply the water for domestic use. They are easily got to flow.

The largest pike ever known to have been captured in Canada was taken at Sturgeon Falls on Thursday and sent to Toronto, where it is being preserved by the Natural History Society. It was 4 feet 8 inches in length, 2 feet in girth and weighed 35 lbs.

The corner stone of St. Joseph's Hospital, Peterborough, was laid Wednesday by Bishop Dowling.

One million ties are wanted out of Muskoka by the Rathoun company to fill a G. T. R. contract.

In Allandale, last week, three men were injured by the cars.

A deer killed in Perry township tipped the scales at 290 lbs.

No new cases of smallpox have been reported from Georgia, or North Gwillimbury.

Mrs. S. Streeter, a widow living near Jackson, made a bank of her sugar box, in which she had \$1,150 in gold. Thieves broke in who knew the combination and now her bank is "busted."

Mr. Robt. McConnell, a St. Vincent farmer, had a ewe 14 years old which raised 26 lambs—two every year, excepting two years she had one and three respectively. One of the lambs each year had horns. He sold her and two lambs for \$10.

Norwood, Oct. 24.—Yesterday evening a man named Hordy, while out shooting about two miles from here, met with a bad accident. He had with him, a double barreled gun. He discharged one barrel and tried the other, but it hung fire. While reloading the empty one, the other discharged, taking effect in his shoulder. His arm will have to be amputated. It is feared he will not recover.

Toronto has another company of surveyors looking over the land with a view to the use of Lake Simcoe's water for city purposes.

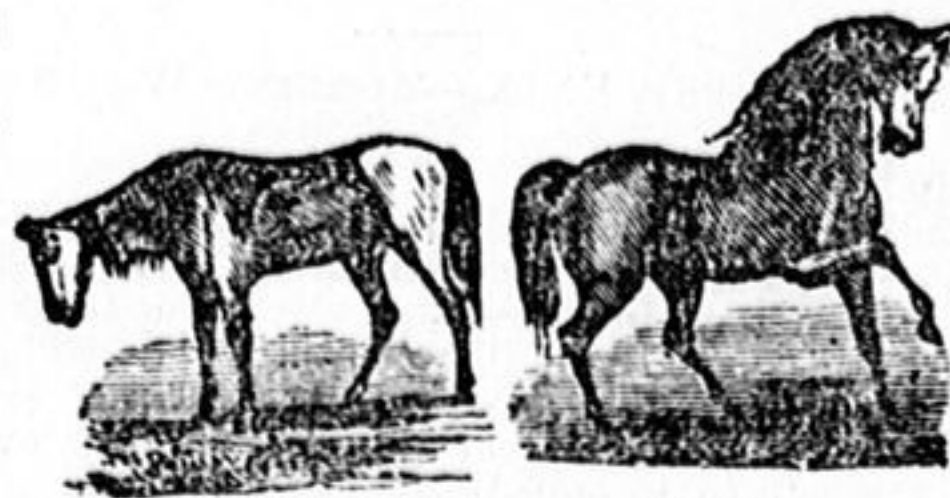
