The Dead.

During the week there has passed to their rest no less than four residents of this locality.

DUNCAN B. McRAE, of 1st concession of Thorah, died on Thursday of last week. A strong, vigorous and healthy man, he was stricken down by a mere trifling. It appears that a short time ago, while harnessing his horse, the animal in its movements threw McRae's head somewhat violently against the stable wall. It was thought nothing of at the time, but after exposure and wet received during a drive to Cannington, the simple contusion rapidly developed into erysipelas from which he died last Thursday. Deceased was 28 years of age. He was buried in the R. C. cemetery.

MALCOLM C. CAMERON, son of Mr. D. Cameron, passed away on Sunday last. The young man, so well known to our citizens had been ailing for the past two years with the feil disease, consumption. He visited California twice, the old country and also British Columbia in the hopes that recovery might reward him but all to no purpose. While in Toronto a short time ago, he was taken suddenly worse and on being brought home last week but little hopes of him were entertained by his friends and on Sunday morning last he passed peacefully away. A clever, genial soul, and a favorite among his companions. "Mac," as he was generally known, will long be regretted and mourned. He was 23 years of age and will be known to our readers as a frequent contributor to these columns while in California and elsewhere.

ROBERT CALDER, of 2nd concession Thorah, died on Tuesday last, of troubles incident to indigestion. He was a sufferer for several years, but since spring his complaint took a more serious and aggravated form which resulted in his passing away on Tuesday. Deceased was 63 years of age.

JOSEPH WILKINSON, who has been since summer a terrible sufferer from fistula, died on Wednesday. During the progress of the distressing malady, he bore his sufferings with a fortitude truly marvellous and christian-like. Deceased was a native of London, England and for the last few years has been in the employ of the G. T. R. here, and was greatly esteemed. He was 59 years of age and leaves a wife and five children to mourn their loss.

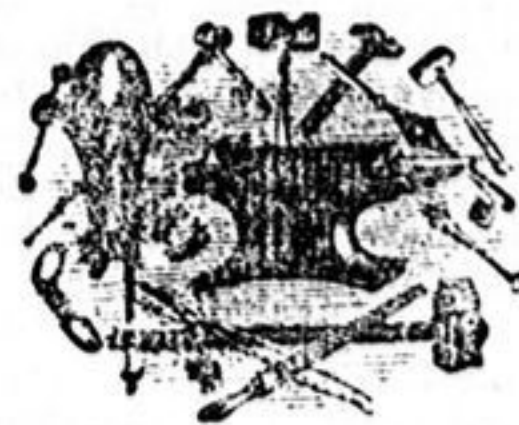
