Cannington Band Concert.—On Friday last we had the pleasure of attending the Concert given by the Cannington Brass Band, in the Town Hall of that village. Although the band has been but recently organized, it has, under the able leadership of Prof. Spaulding, made remarkable progress, and plays very nicely, the selections given during the evening being really splendid. The chair was ably filled by Mr. P. Ellis. The programme was opened by the band, and was followed by a comic song by Mr. W. Wamslie, of Toronto, who was rapturously cheered. Mr. Wamslie sang several pieces, and his popularity before a Cannington audience was manifested by the repeated encores. Miss M. Talbot sang "Cantilena," and "The White Squall," with fine effect, Miss Wyatt presiding at the piano. The string band, under the leadership of Mr. George Burnham, played some very fine selections, which added greatly to the enjoyment of the evening. Miss H. G. Stott and Miss M. E. Stuart, of Woodville, sang, "Drifting with the Tide," "The Starlight," and "Somebody's coming when the Dewdrops Fall," were deservedly applauded. Mr. Spaulding's cornet solo was a feature deserving of note, while Mrs. Barnham's rendition of "The Maple Leaf," and "The Merriest Girl that's out," was very good. Mrs. E. Pringle played the piano accompaniments for Mr. Wamslie in a very nice manner. The concert was a decided success, and a neat sum was added to the band fund.
