WINTER TREATMENT OF POULTRY.

Hens will lay up to Christmas, if they have warm quarters. A manure shed, where mixed manure throws off considerable warmth, and which is closed in, but well ventilated, is an excellent place for fowls. They are kept warm and comfortable, their droppings are all saved, going to enrich the manure, and they keep on laying, often all winter. At noon feed, in potatoes mixed with bran and cornmeal, or something of the kind; at night give a good feed of whole grain, throwing down enough to toll them off the roosts for an early breakfast, unless thereby you will be feeding an army of rats all night. In snowy and frozen weather, feed three times a day, and give only what they will run after at each meal.

EXTENSIVE FARMING.

The famous Grandin farm, in Dakota, produced this year 137,287 bushels of wheat on 5,921 acres of land, an average of 23 1-16 bushels to the acre, nine-tenths of which was "No. 1, hard." The Grandins, proprietors, claim that 37,000 bushels of this crop will pay all costs of cultivation, harvesting and marketing, leaving 100,000 bushels to represent the net profit. This, at 75 to 80 cents the bushel, which has been the range at the receiving stations of the North Pacific road, is at least \$75,000, a very fair profit for a farmer who has no heavy rental to pay. The proprietors are, therefore, encouraged to put in 8,000 acres next year.

OTHER NOTES. A correspondent of the Fruit Recorder says his observation, extending over many years, goes to show that dry rot in apples is caused by poverty of the soil or want of moisture at some period of growth. Some apples may be more subject to it than others. The same kind of apples will be affected or free from it according to the situation of the orchard—those planted on deep rich soil are generally free from it, while those on shallow or poor soil are often affected.
