OSHAWA.

A BAND.—An effort is being made by the Fire Brigade to establish a brass band in connection with that organization. We hope the effort will be a successful undertaking. There are yet about 60,000 bushels of barley to be shipped from the Oshawa harbor.

RAILWAY AMALGAMATION.—In all the reports of the amalgamation of the Midland, Toronto and Nipissing and other railways, no mention is made of the northern part of the Nipissing. All that is touched on is from Woodville south to Toronto. In a recent issue of one of our journals a statement was made that there would be two fast trains between Lindsay and Toronto and return in the same day. Now is there never going to be a fast train, even one, between Cobocok and Toronto and return in the same day? Persons north of Midland Junction have to take two days to visit Toronto when they desire, because there is no train going further north than Woodville. The Nipissing Railway does a large business in the carrying of Toronto to wood, lumber, timber, lime, &c. Indeed the greater share of the freight is from the north, and still we are to be blessed by having a slow coach between here and Uxbridge. Why can we not have a fast train to connect with the morning fast train from Lindsay going to Toronto, and also one in the evening coming from the city.
