Resolved, that the Reeve give his order on the Treasurer in favor of Hector Cameron for \$17.00, for repairing bridge between Lots 15 and 18, Con. 13. Resolved, that the Reeve give his orders on the Treasurer in favor of James Chidley for \$4 00, for work between Lots 5 and 6, Con. 8; also \$1.00 for removing stumps off road between Lots 15 and 16, Con. 13. Resolved, that the Reeve give his order on the Treasurer in favor of William Thornborn for \$13.00. for building culvert, Con. 2, Lot 1.
