The poultry season has fairly set in and it is desirable that those who kill to sell should do so under the best conditions. The following hints by a dealer who handles a great deal of poultry in season may be worth making a note of: Poultry should not be fasted 24 hours previous to killing. Bleed well and pluck clean, leaving on the head, also the wing and tail feathers in. Entrails should not be drawn, neither should poultry be scalded. It is easily detected and means from one to three cents per pound reduction in value. If the poultry is intended for shipment, pack firmly in nice, clean cases holding from one to two hundred pounds. Mark each case with correct weights—gross, tare, and net, also number and kind of birds contained, and advise the firm to whom you ship of the particulars of your consignment, and its proper delivery may be looked after, and when this is done, satisfactory returns may confidently be looked for.



Editorial Notes.

LORD DUFFERIN, who now seems to have absolute power in Egypt, has summarily deposed Baker Pasha from his place as Commander-in-chief to the Egyptian army. He is relegated to the charge of the police, and his place is to be filled by an English officer, with an English staff. In separating Egypt from Turkey, it was not thought wise to have the Egyptian army in the hands of a confidant of the Sultan. Lord Dufferin is really the British Resident at the head of an arbitrary protectorate.

The Executive of Ontario Branch of the Dominion Alliance have set apart Sunday, Dec. 17th, as "Temperance Sunday." Ministers of all denominations in Ontario have been invited to preach to their congregations on that day on some phase of the Temperance work. The proposal of setting apart a Sunday for special appeal, is a good one. The magnitude of the evil warrants the taking of more active measures for its entire suppression. The work cannot be carried on without funds, and an appeal has been made to the ministers and people for the collection on that Sunday, to help in this direction. We trust that this request will meet with a liberal response, as the cause of Temperance has suffered very much in the past for want of money to carry on its operations.
