Correspondence.

To the Editor of the WOODVILLE ADVOCATE:

SIR.—My attention has been called to a
communication signed "Justitia," in last
week's issue of your paper, which attacks
the writers of two communications in the
Cannington Gleaner in a most abusive man-
ner. Now, Sir, as the writer of one of
these I claim the right to reply, and in the
first place protest against the style of
"Justitia's" letter; such abuse is not gen-
tlemanly, nor characteristic of principle.
I challenge "Justitia" to prove any one
point of his slandering communication, only
that it is undoubtedly an excellent por-
trayal of the stolid intellect of an ignoramus,
who, under an assumed name, endeavours
to convey to your readers that he is able to
fix a standard of learning, and also, quite
proficient in the art of vilifying other
people's characters. He starts out with a
falseness in the first place, that the criti-
cisms were published "in a paper through
which (sic) columns it would be impossible
to reply." The opportunity to reply was
never asked for, and consequently was not
refused, as for illiteracy, the party signing
himself "Justitia" would carry off the palm
from anything within the two counties, and
I have only to refer to his own communi-
cation for an exceedingly good representation.
The lauding of his own brain culture is
sufficient to convince any reasonable person
of his narrow-mindedness and utter incapacity
of criticising others. I would urge upon
"Justitia" the necessity for a nearer appli-
cation of truth to his statements, with less
of exaggeration. He displays a great want
of more enlightened ideas of morality and
principle. If he had sufficient of the latter
his name would have appeared at the *head*
of his ungrammatical and unequalled com-
position, but no—moral courage was want-
ing; his great aim was to vilify personal
characters, if he could, but he will need to
get a better foundation for his assertions ere
he attains that seemingly much longed for
purpose. He, with the most sublime igno-
rance of everything pertaining to good man-
ners, or the proper conduct of persons in a
house of worship, defends "grimming" in
church, and no doubt thinks the practice so
commendable that it should be more gen-
erally adopted. How elevating it would be
to have a whole congregation "grimming"
during service! As to ladies smoking,
why, that is just the proper thing in the
eyes of "Justitia," and all who condemn
the practice must be the worst of imbeciles!
Not content with this, he slanders the
whole population of Cannington, by saying,
that any opposition to ladies smoking is
looked upon as "flighty and nonsensical
ideas" showing "unmistakable signs of
budding insanity." The insanity is on the
part of "Justitia," who needs a better
schooling as to the welfare of the rising
generation both in the present and future.
The defamatory statements of "Justitia"
deserve the severest censure. My letter
to the *Gleaner* was solely a denial as to
authorship of the paragraph with reference
to ladies smoking, and in answer to the
insulting paper sent me, consequently,
"Justitia" had no cause for complaint.
