THE increasing popularity of coal stoves, of which twenty-five or thirty are already in use in this village, is having a marked effect on the price of wood. In Lindsay, last Monday, we saw some choice dry sawed beech and maple which was bought for \$4 per cord, though that was said to be a trifle under the market price, and dry sawed hardwood is now offered in Fenelon Falls for \$3 per cord. The farmers of this neighborhood made a mistake when they persisted in keeping wood up to the artificial price created by the snow blockade two years ago, the result of which was that a great many people took to burning coal, and the number is increasing every winter.—Fenelon Falls Gazette.—The same result has occurred here and it is quite probable that in a few years more but little wood will be required in this village. As it is, hardwood is not easily disposed of now at \$4 per cord and with the advent of more coal stoves, the wood business will be completely ruined.
