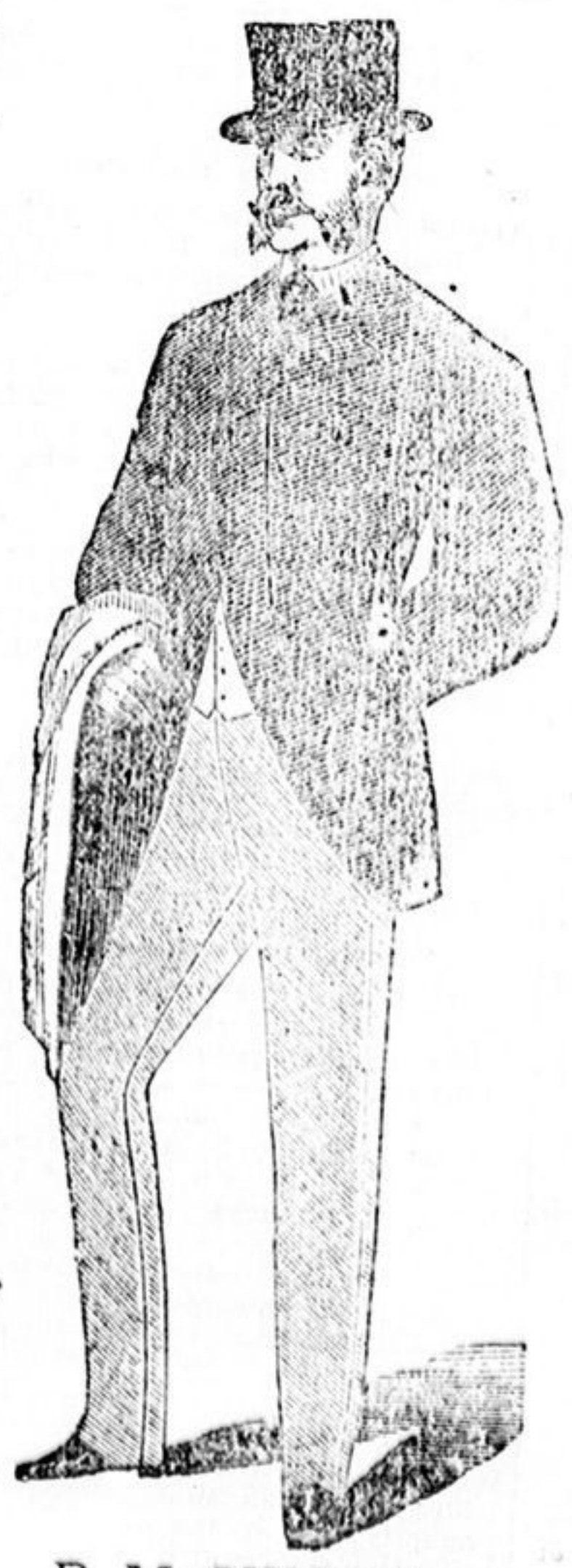

To the Editor of the BEAVERTON EXPRESS.

Sir,—In a few days the electors of this Municipality will be called on to select their rulers for another year, and just now where we hear so much claptrap about the great influence possessed by the rival candidates for the Reeve'ship, I should like to call the attention of these gentlemen to a few of the bills this town is heir to and trust they will find a remedy and earn the lasting gratitude of the peaceable citizens of this place. In the first place we want some means of fighting a fire, should one occur. A Hook and Ladder Company could be organized cheaply and easily, all that is required is the use of a little influence with the council for a small grant of money; the balance I think would be made up by the merchants to equip one. Another good move would be the punishment by heavy fine of the drunken scoundrels who are in the habit of ringing the bell and yelling fire in the dead of the night. This thing has been done so often that scarcely anybody pays attention to its ringing. This is a deplorable state of affairs in a town like this where there are so many wooden buildings, and some by-law should be passed or enforced if we have one, to fine the careless storekeepers for throwing their old cases, straw and cardboard boxes, and such inflammable trash just outside their back doors, thereby endangering the property of landlords and neighbors. We narrowly escaped having a great conflagration through and the neglect of one person a few days ago, which if not promptly suppressed will cause the destruction of the village sooner or later. Now, gentlemen, you have both promised if elected, to do your best for us, and we have taken your word for it.
