Orillia and the Yacht Race.

To the Editor of THE EXPRESS.

SIR,—In my travels, few places have I seen so favorably, nay, beautifully situated as Orillia, having the advantages of two railways, the Midland and the Northern, passing through the town. Lying on one side is Lake Couchiching, with its parks and islands and on the other side, separated by the Narrows from Couchiching, is Lake Simcoe, its pebbly bottom, clear water and beautiful islands is a sight that tourists and lovers of the beautiful in nature look on with pleasure and delight. But unfortunately every rose has its thorn and Orillia is not an exception and her thorn is the inordinate vanity and imbecility of too many of her populace. Our weak-minded neighbors think what clever men can do they should, that their whims and wishes should be attended to, regardless of the inconvenience and expense to their less fortunate neighbors. They possess some degree of low cunning and have no respect for truth and honesty. Example,—Last summer they advertised a regatta to take place on Lake Couchiching, with 1st, 2nd and 3rd prizes to winning yachts. Beaverton yachtsmen were invited to enter and contest the race. Four Beaverton yachts accepted the invitation and in doing so gave the Orillia would-be-sports a double surprise. First they were surprised, as they said, that their "yare" tubs had the audacity to enter the lists with their "yats." Secondly, that the tubs sailed away and left their yachts nowhere in the race. In return the Orillians surprised the Beaverton crews by telling them they had not the money for them and that they did not intend to pay the prizes. What they wanted was to get Beavertonians over there to spend their money. Such conduct on the part of responsible persons would be despicable. Being done by our neighbors it is considered a freak of their nature more to be deplored than censured. Poor creatures! perhaps they needed money instead of having any to spend on the regatta and took that way to get some. On the 5th October, ult., the Secretary of the Orillia Rifle Association wrote the Secretary of the Beaverton club inviting them to shoot a match with the Orillia club at the latter place on thanksgiving day the 17th of October. The Secretary of the Beaverton club wrote informing him that a match had been arranged for at Beaverton for the 17th, but would be glad to arrange a match with Orillia for some other date. Not long thereafter a contemporary printed an article from Orillia expressing surprise and disgust, because of the Beaverton club not having accepted their challenge to shoot and applied such silly epithets as Suckertown, &c. If such silliness gratifies the Orillia people and evidently it does or their journals would not print it, it does not annoy us. Having the past before their eyes, the Orillians might well have been surprised had the Beaverton club accepted the invitation. If what we hear of the Orillia shootists be true, they would be no better in a shooting match than they are in a yacht race. Why, four chances to one they would not hit one side of a barn with a rifle bullet if they were inside and the doors shut. These Orillia dudes have a malady that yachting and target shooting is not a specific for, what they need is development of the brain and muscle, change of diet for them is a necessity. Beaverton can supply them gratis; if they come here for treatment we can give the best of bread, oat-meal porridge, oat-meal cakes, all kinds of meats, fowl, fruits, sauces, vegetables and last but not essential, fish, especially suckers, (not the kind of suckers they are, wanting fins but not the scales) in season, such a change of diet will develop brain

and muscle and cure them if cured they can be. Then they may go home, build yachts and sail them, also shoot at rifle ranges with some chance of success, have some pride of character and they will pay their debts of honor. They may have athletes among themselves so they won't have to come to Beaverton for help in their emergencies to save them from disgrace. Try it Orillians by all means, try it, you may succeed, at present you command our commiseration.
