

**Scott Act Notes.**

Rumor says that the anti-Scott Act or repeal petitions for the county are in inextricable confusion, the names being all mixed up, and that the work will all have to be done over again. In view of the record of those counties that have reverted to the license law, we should think there would be some difficulty in again getting as many names to the petition. Mr. Horne, Police-Magistrate, has furnished us a statement of Scott Act matters in this county, as shown by his books up to November 28th, 1888. The number of cases entered was 400. number of convictions, 237; dismissals, 106; withdrawals, 21; unserved on account of defendants skipping, 36; fines imposed, \$18,450; twenty-one against whom convictions had been secured, absconded, owing \$1,200 in fines; one \$50 conviction was quashed; \$8,050 has been collected and paid to the County Treasurer; \$3,150 remains unpaid; 17 persons were committed in default of fines amounting to \$1,000. Twenty-eight cases were appealed; one was quashed, 17 confirmed and 10 are undecided. This statement, as mentioned before, is up to November 28th, the day that the books were inspected by J. W. Manning, of the Provincial Treasury Department, Canada Temperance Act Division, Toronto, and, in addition to the above there is the amount of fines paid to the Treasurer by the Police Magistrate of Whitby and Oshawa, and by other Magistrates.

S. Alcock of the Plank House, as well as his wife, was charged on Tuesday here with a violation of the act. Mrs. Alcock's case was dismissed, but the verdict in his case was 60 days imprisonment without the option of a fine, sentence, however, not to be carried out unless he again breaks the law, and in that event the term might be doubled on account of the extra offence. There are six others in the county in a similar position, viz: Messrs. Bennett, Uxbridge Overend, Mara; Mrs. Meacham, Game-bridge; Messrs. Smith and McIntyre, Cannington, and T. Lancaster, Port Perry. It is reported of a Pickering hotel keeper that, after being fined two or three times himself, and having several bartenders fined in succession, one of the bartenders was up on a second charge and fined \$100 or 60 days. The story goes that the hotel keeper offered him \$60 to go to goal, which the bartender accepted, thus making \$60 for himself and saving \$40 for his employer.—"Uxbridge Journal."

An Order-in-Council has been passed prohibiting the cutting, carrying away or removing away of any hard or sugar maple tree or sapling from Parry island by the licensees of the timber on that island, or by any other party, under pain of the penalties specified in section 32 of the Indian Act.
