—It is reported in Winnipeg that the Roblin government will appeal to the court in June.

—At Souris on Friday last a farm laborer named E. Burgoyne was killed from a kick in the stomach by a horse.

—A man who gave his name as H. Crawford has fleeced people in Bramford by giving out bogus money.

—The memorial tablet to the late H. L. Borden was unveiled in Mount Allison, N.B., University chapel on Wednesday.

—Birtle farmers have passed a resolution urging that the Manitoba government take into consideration and devise some scheme by which relief in hauling grain would be granted in this and future years, either by government ownership or a system of elevators.

—Miss Christine Byrnes, a milliner of Brockville, Ont., who went to Pittsburgh Pa., on November 27, 1901 has brought a breach of promise suit against Samuel D. Williams, a wealthy widower of that city, for \$10,000. She says he has courted her for 20 years.

—At the annual meeting of the Menab Street Presbyterian Church, Hamilton, on Thursday, Rev. Dr. Fletcher announced his need of an assistant pastor for two years, stating that if spared till the end of that time he would tender his resignation. He is 70 years of age.

—A proposal to institute a co-operative coal and wood yard, with a capital of \$20,000, in 2,000 shares, in London Ont., has been endorsed by the local Trades and Labor Council. A scheme is also mooted in London to organize a new fuel company, with a capital of \$40,000 with shares at \$25 each.

—The Canadian Post-office Department has concluded negotiations with the Colony of Trinidad and Tobago and with the Kingdom of Norway for the direct exchange of money orders.

—A recount of the votes in the last municipal election in Strathroy Ont., will take place before the judge on January 27.

—The Ottawa Gas Company promises cheaper gas as soon as the present fuel stringency is over.

—The arrest has been made in Winnipeg of Clarence Donaghy, who is wanted in Brighton, Ont., on a charge of embezzlement.

—The Grand Jury at Ottawa referred in very strong terms to the unsatisfactory condition of the Court House.

—Charles Daker, jr., of Westminster, Ont., a trooper in the second South African contingent, was presented in the town hall with a gold watch and chain by the Westminster township council on account of his services in the war.

—It is rumored that Mr. L. O. David, city clerk of Montreal, may be appointed senator, and also editor of the new French Liberal paper or but he declines to say anything about it, except that the subject was broached to him in an informal way.

—A meeting will be held in Hamilton on Wednesday next for the organization of a promotion society, whose aim shall be the promotion of the Ambitious City by pointing out to manufacturers its advantages of location.

—The Montreal Coal and Towing Company is suing the British Empire Mutual Life Assurance Company for \$8,500, the amount of a policy on the life of the late Ernest G. Muir, who was accidentally shot some weeks ago.

—The Hamilton Board of Trade passed a very appropriate resolution as a tribute to the late Senator Wood, and decided to attend the funeral in a body.

—Colonel Prior and other members of the British Columbia Cabinet are on their way to Ottawa. Colonel Prior will attend a meeting of Provincial premiers on Tuesday next.

**FEBRUARY WEATHER**

**Iri Hicks Says Next Month Will Be Very Unpleasant Sudden Changes**

February is the shortest month in the year; that may be the reason Prof. Iri Hicks has published such a short weather forecast for it in Word and Works; but short though the month is, it will be quite long enough if its weather will be what the professor says it will be.

At any rate he has made many very accurate forecasts, and here is what he says about the coming month. The reference to diagrams will of course be of no service apart from his own paper in which these are given. Because the forecast is so brief it is reproduced in full as a sample for our readers who hitherto have only seen considerations of his articles on the weather. The article is as follows:

Important things to keep in mind, in connection with the forecasts, storm and weather for February, are that a Venus perturbation covers nearly the whole of the month, while the Vernal equinox meets and combines with the Venus period from about the 10th to the 15th of the month. These facts will not obliterate or change the regular storm periods except that the regular periods will all be prolonged and intensified by Venus and Earth.

The month will open warm and threatening. Moon is on celestial equator on the 1st, tending greatly to excite electrical storms in many places. Disturbances will continue until about the 4th, bringing heavy rains, turning later to snow over much of the country. It is safe to say that this first February period, like all the following periods of the month, will begin with moderate to warm, bright days, but rain, with wind and thunder southward will follow and turn quickly to snow, sleet and very cold weather.

Sunday the 8th to Thursday the 12th. The days of greatest violence will be on and touching the 10th and 11th. Dangerously high tides will be most natural, with strong probabilities of seismic disturbances, and heavy tropical storms in the south. Violent rains may be expected generally over southern and central parts of the country, while a coral counterpart in the form of a serious snow storm and blizzard from the west and north need not surprise any reader. The crisis of these disturbances will come on and next to the 11th. The cold wave that would naturally appear about the 11th may possibly be retarded until after the moon's passage over the celestial equator on the 13th. But those who do not prepare for hard winter storms, and for a great cold wave and blizzard between the 9th and 16th of February, will, we fear, pay a costly penalty. The final culmination of these storms may not come before the 14th and 15th which are central anti-cyclonic storm days; but we caution all, especially those who have large live stock interests at stake to be on guard any time from the 9th until the culmination comes. Don't be deceived by delays and pleasant weather.

The storm period extending from the 9th to the 23rd is covered by many disturbing factors, as may be seen in the storm diagram. Vulcan, Mercury, Venus and Earth, all combine with moon at south declination, at last quarter and in apogee. This period during its opening stages will bring change to quite warm for the season, the barometer will fall to unusually low readings, and heavy showers of rain, wind and thunder will speedily be followed by change to sleet and snow, all winding up with stiff wintry gales and a cold wave from the north west. Much danger may be apprehended at this and other February periods, from the gorging of streams and rivers by sudden floods and the jamming of ice, moving and crushing ice. Look for several days of crisp, freezing weather, after the storms of this period pass off.

The last three days of the month will bring return of general storm conditions, winding up on the 28th with electrical disturbances and heavy rains in many sections of the country. Upon the whole, we forecast an unusually stormy and disagreeable February—a commingling of Vernal, tropical storms, with boreal and wintry visitations giving us a succession of extreme perturbations, attended by sudden revolutions of freezing and thawing. To say nothing of the extra astronomical causes bearing on this month, the regular annual progress of solar energy from the south, combating boreal conditions from the north is

Accurate Instruments.

There is no doubt Mr. Stupart said that the thermometers used in the early days of the Toronto Observatory were accurate and entirely comparable with those used now, and the observers were equally reliable. The observations have been taken on the same plot of ground since 1840, and while environment has certainly changed somewhat the change in respect has been such that we might almost expect to find a tendency for higher rather than for lower thermometer readings near the city. From a close study of climate Mr. Stupart said he could not for a moment suppose that the climate of any locality changes appreciably in the lifetime of a man. Change does certainly occur, but probably at a rate comparable with geological changes.
