ROTHSCHILD'S INTERESTED.  
A New Market for Cobalt Miners in Sight.  
It is possible that the New Jersey smelter syndicate, against the methods of which the mining men of Cobalt have frequently complained, will soon have a rival, namely the English branch of the great Rothschild tenton to the ores of Cobalt, which they are now paying practical attention to the ores of Cobalt, which offer some difficulties in regard to smelting, having received on Friday a shipment of twenty tons from several mines in Ontario's new rich mineral area. This shipment was made in response to a request by Baron Rothschild to Hon. Mr. Matheson when the latter was in England in connection with the renewal of the Temiskaming & Northern Railway loan, and was arranged for by Hon. Mr. Cochrane, Minister of Lands and Mines. A cable announcement of its safe arrival has been received.  
Baron Rothschild remarked to Hon. Mr. Matheson, after an assay had been made of samples taken by the latter to England, "I think we can refine this." If the experiments with the shipment should confirm the Baron's view, the competition thus engendered would be of immense value to the Cobalt miners, who are now practically at the mercy of the American smelter syndicate. It is thought that the Rothschilds would not erect a smelter here, preferring to have the work carried out at establishments in Europe which they at least for a sampling plant in the Cobalt district, and perhaps elsewhere, is understood to be under reasonable freight rates the miners would be able to obtain as good, and perhaps better, prices for their ores than in New Jersey.
