Obituary

DR. THOS. NEELANDS.
Dr. Thomas Neelands, one of Port Hope's most respected citizens, and brother of Dr. J. Neelands of this town, passed away on Saturday morning in the 65th year of his age. The deceased, who was an ardent sportsman, contracted typhoid fever while deer-shooting last November, but complications set in at the last causing death. He was born in Western Ontario, but had been a life-long resident of Port Hope, where for the past forty years he has had an extensive dental practice. In his demise the Methodist church loses a valued member of its Board of Managers, treasurer of the church for thirty years, and its foremost Sunday school worker. He was an active supporter of the Y.M.C.A. A widow and one married daughter, Mrs. (Dr.) Bruce Hewson of Colborne survive.
