**News of Town and Country Briefly Told**

The "Boys'" dance held at the Benson House last Friday was a most enjoyable and successful affair. About thirty-five couples were present, and dancing was kept up till the early hours of the morning. The music was rendered in a most delightful manner by Glionna's orchestra of Toronto. The corridors upstairs had been prettily decorated, supper being served at a number of small tables. The catering was all that could be desired, and Mr. O'Neil is worthy of all praise for the admirable arrangements made for the enjoyment of his guests.

A large excursion under the auspices of the Queen-st. Methodist church left by the G.T.R. this morning for Toronto. Many of the excursionists intend hearing the great revivalists, Torrey and Alexander, who are having such remarkable success at their meetings.

I looked upon the medical profession as the first of all professions, but if the practitioner is going to bridge the chasm between the 'bum' and the 'beer', then the public will hear of it." The case was also adjourned until to-morrow, Friday.

John Britton alias Black Jack, was fined \$2 and costs or \$6.45 in all for being drunk and disorderly in the Grand Union hotel on Saturday, December 30th.

William Macpherson of Omemee was prosecuted last Friday for illegal fishing. The complaint was laid by Fishery Inspector Toole, who is taking the place of Mr. Geo. Fitzgerald, who is sick. Macpherson was charged with using a wire snare and decoy through a hole in the ice in Pigeon River. The case was tried by County Magistrate McSweeney, who found prisoner guilty and fined him \$8, and costs, or \$12.10 in all.
