Sir,—On nomination day Ex-Reeve Jackson disputed the figures I quoted, showing the receipts and expenditures of Council for the year 1905 and when he went to the Treasurer and got the figures from him he had to admit that I was right as to the amount in the treasury Dec. 31st of 1904. He said that the Council of 1905 only spent \$4800. If that is all they spent where did the balance go? They raised \$5,461.46 for township purposes; they got \$230 for land sold and left the treasury with \$1,930. less money in it than when they took office, which added to the \$230 makes \$2,160. Add 46, makes \$7,621.46, leaving a balance over what he claims they spent (\$4,800) of \$2,821.46. I think before Ex-reeve Jackson asks you to elect him to the responsible position of Reeve, he should explain, if he can, where the money went.

After all transactions for the year 1906 are paid, we have \$1,456.84 in the treasury, or after deducting \$870.00 in the treasury when we took office, leaves \$586.84 to the good on our year's transactions. WM. H. WILSON.
