SPECIAL MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

SOME NECESSARY ITEMS OF BUSINESS DEALT WITH ON WEDNESDAY EVENING LAST.

The various committees of the Town Council met in the Council Chamber on Wednesday evening, December 20. Mayor Vrooman, Ald. Rea, Eyres, Maunder, Beggs, Fisher and O'Reilly were present.

The Treasurer's abstract statement of receipts and expenditures from December 15, 1905 to December 15, 1906, was presented. It shows receipts from December 15 to December 31, 1905, of \$13,459.56, and expenditures of the same amount including balance on hand at December 31, of \$706.90.

Mayor Vrooman asked why the assets were placed at \$261,082 this year and only \$212,000 last year. Treasurer Knowlson explained that last year he had only included the local improvement rates for the year, while Auditor Eagleson said the whole of the rates for the period of years the debentures were to run should be included.

William Combes wrote asking the use of the Council Chamber for the annual ball of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen on January 29. Granted on the usual conditions.
