CHEESE AND BUTTER MAKERS FORM AN ORGANIZATION

The Counties of Ontario, Victoria and Haliburton Included—Officers Elected—Raising the Price of Manufacture Favored

On Saturday last, January 5, a meeting was held in the Council Chamber, Lindsay, of the butter and cheese makers of Ontario, Victoria and Haliburton counties. Mr. Wm. Newman, of Lorneville, was appointed chairman, and G. A. Gillespie, Peterboro, secretary. In opening the meeting Mr. Newman explained that the meeting was called for the purpose of considering the cost of manufacturing, and other important matters with the dairy business. The meeting until adjournment at 12 o'clock went into a discussion on the care of cream and manufacturing of butter. ADDRESSES ON POINTS OF INTEREST. The afternoon meeting opened at 2:30 with a good attendance of both cheese and butter makers. The first speaker was Mr. Stonehouse, proprietor and maker of the Fort Perry creamery, and at present instructor of the butter making in the Kingston Dairy School. In opening his address, the speaker said he had prepared no particular speech and would rather listen to discussion, but as he had had some experience in dairy business as a manufacturer and promoter of creameries he would throw out a few remarks on the matter. At the annual convention of the Eastern Dairymen's Association, the manufacturing of butter was hardly touched on, but cheese has all the sway, and at these small meetings he would like to have all the discussion possible. The two methods now in vogue of operating creameries are the cream gathering, and the whole milk system where the milk is separated at the factory. The former method was

RESOLUTIONS.

The following resolutions were passed at the meeting: 1. That in view of the increased expense in manufacturing the price of manufacturing should be advanced on both cheese and butter. 2. That this meeting recommend to the Eastern Ontario Dairymen's Association that they press for legislation giving the owners of factories the right to ask for the appointment of arbitrators to determine the damage done to their business when a factory is built in their close proximity. 3. That this meeting is in sympathy with the movement to have the cheese and butter makers placed on some legal standing. 4. That we to-day form ourselves into an association to be known as the Ontario, Victoria and Haliburton Association, and adopt the by-laws as read.

OFFICERS ELECTED. Officers were elected as follows: Pres., Wm. Newman, Lorneville; Vice-Pres., Jas. Stonehouse, Port Perry; Sect.-Treas., M. J. Lewis, Lindsay. Mr. Newman was appointed a delegate to attend the E. D. A., at Ottawa.

MINDEN VALLEY BRANCH OF TRENT VALLEY CANAL

COL. HUGHES, M.P., POINTS OUT ITS FEASIBILITY, AND ADVANTAGES AT A MEETING AT MINDEN.

In an article under the heading "The Minden Valley Canal," the Minden Echo says: This was the topic of discussion on Friday evening last by a few friends in Mortimer's Hotel, Minden. Colonel Sam. Hughes, M.P., was driven by Mr. James Thompson from Kimmount that afternoon, the Colonel having wired the day before to gather a few gentlemen together to discuss the proposition. Recently in the House of Commons at Ottawa in reply to a speech by Colonel Hughes in favor of these waterways, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, while admitting he had formerly been wrong in his views re the Trent Canal, but now favored that project; said that he would also favor branch canals and waterways to the main canal, but was informed that Haliburton County was unfitted for and should be set apart for a "Forest Reserve." The Colonel in reply had shown the Prime Minister that he had been wrongly informed. On Friday evening last the member for Victoria and Haliburton recited the history of the proposition. Twenty years ago it was impressed upon him by Messrs. James Mortimer, McIntosh, Delamoro, Baker, Gainer, Wright Bros., and many others. Early in the nineties Col. Hughes had Government Engineers report on the proposition. In 1892 or 1893 the Colonel submitted his plan to the Government, and Engineers' reports confirmed its feasibility and utility. The late Mr. Robert Mortimer had conducted the Engineers all through these waterways on the tour of inspection. The plans involve the following: 1. A dam and locks at Cobocook. 2. Blasting the "Portage" below Norland. 3. A dam and lock at Norland. 4. Further blasting "The Natural Dam" above Norland. 5. A dam and lock at Elliott's Falls. 6. Blasting the ledge of rock at Moor's Falls. 7. Dredging a few yards at entrance of Gull Lake. This would be all that would be necessary to reach Minden. To proceed onward would require: 8. A trestle cable tramway for boats from Gull river below Stirnson's mill, to the top of the bank at the south end of Mountain lake run by water power. 9. A dam between Horseshoe and Mountain lake. 10. Blasting the ledge between Mountain and Twelve-Mile lakes. 11. A dam and locks between Beech and Maple lakes. With these completed there would be continuous navigation from Cranberry lake, through Pine, Grass, Maple, Beech, the Big Bosking, Little Bosking, Twelve Mile, Mountain, Minden River, Gull Lake, North Lake, the Norland River, Mud Turtle lakes, and Cobocook river to Balsam Lake, there connecting with the main canal and the railways, a total distance of from fifty to sixty miles.

The carrying out of this proposition, the member for Victoria and Haliburton pointed out, would confer immense benefits, among others the following: Giving the farmers and other residents access to the open markets of the country. The development of mining. The taking to market of the great quantities of hardwood timber, now valueless.

Horse Breeders Combine and Form One Society

A meeting of much importance to horse breeders was held in the King Edward Hotel, Toronto, on January 3, when a new Ontario Horse Breeders' Association was formed and officers elected. The meeting was held on the authority of the Provincial Act passed last session respecting agricultural associations, and included representatives from the Canadian Clydesdale, Shire, Thoroughbred, and Standard-bred Trotter Associations and Hackney and Pony Societies, which will now be combined in a strong organization. Any other society incorporated under the Dominion Act for record associations may also be represented in the new society. The officers elected were: Mr. William Smith (Columbus), president; Mr. T. A. Graham (Claremont), vice-president, and Mr. A. P. Westervelt, secretary-treasurer, with a board of 18 directors.
