Defeat of Filtering By-law

The defeat of the by-law to expend \$20,000 on a slow sand filtering plant for the town water supply, it is needless to say, is much regretted by the Watchman-Warder. One deeming feature of the rejection the proposal is that public sentiment seems to be slowly advancing in regard to this matter. A referfile of this paper for 1905, when a similar by-law was submitted shows that the vote then was 104 in favor of the proposition and 504 against, or practically five to one in opposition. On Monday last 526 voted against the by-law, which was 22 more than two years ago. On the other hand 246 cast their ballots to secure the filtrat on scheme, nearly two and a half times as many on its former submission. There is therefore, a ray of hope in the situation.
