FIRST MEETING OF MANY NEW MUNICIPAL COUNCILS

Officers for the Year Appointed—Much Business of a necessary Character Transacted—What the Mills will Grind yet to be Developed

The Township Councils all met on Monday, January 14, in accordance with statute. The proceedings of one or two came to hand last week too late for insertion. Following is the budget received up till the time this portion of the Watchman-Warder was made up:

OPS

The inaugural meeting of Ops Council was held on Monday, January 14th, beginning at 11 a. m., when the members made the prescribed declaration of qualification and office.

Reeve Hopkins then addressed the members, congratulating the old members on their re-election and welcoming Mr. O'Loughlin to the council. He hoped they would all work harmoniously for the general welfare of the township. As the Reeves of municipalities were in a measure responsible for expenditure on roads, etc., and were expected to give a full explanation of such expenditure at the ensuing nomination, he was quite willing if the members so desired, to view the respective road divisions in turn with the commissioners, and make such suggestions as appeared to him reasonable with regard to the expenditure and distribution of the appropriation in each division.

The Council then adjourned till 1:30 p. m., when the regular routine of business began.

COMMUNICATIONS.

The following communications were read:

Applications from W. E. Agnew, Thos. C. Maher, Walter Lee, James Farrelly and Wm. Elliott for the office of auditor.

From John Thos. Currins and John Deyell, for the office of assessor.

A letter from K. W. McKay, Secretary of the Ontario Municipal Association, enclosing a petition praying that the Legislature amend Section 606 of the Municipal Act, to remove some of the heavy responsibility now resting on municipalities under said Act in regard to accidents on public highways.

An appeal from the Hospital for Sick Children for a grant.

A letter from the County Clerk stating the amount paid to the treasurer of the township in 1906.

A letter from the G. T. R. Company, stating that repairs had been made north of the town as requested.

A petition from David S. Rea, E. Pogue, Geo. Smith and other ratepayers of Ward Div. No. 5, stated that the Commissioner of said division had not expended a fair share of the money appropriated, in the eastern part of the division, but had expended nearly all in the west part, and prayed that another Commissioner be appointed in his place.

Mr. Best, the Commissioner referred to, said that in conformity with his declaration of office he had expended the money at his disposal for the best interest of the township, and was prepared to show that none was misapplied.

The suggestion made by the Reeve in his opening address was now applicable, and Mr. Coulter moved, seconded by Mr. Wilson, that the Reeve accompany the Commissioners and aid them in making such distribution of their appropriations as to him and them seem most needed. Carried.

The deputation for Div. 5 then withdrew.

OFFICERS APPOINTED.

Mr. Wilson moved, seconded by Mr. Coulter, that Wm. E. Agnew and Walter Lee be appointed auditors of the accounts for 1906.

Mr. O'Loughlin moved in amendment that Wm. E. Agnew and Jas. Farrelly be appointed. The Reeve said he had no objection to Mr.

ELDON

Meeting was held in McKenzie's Hall, Kirkfield, on Jan. 14, 1907.

Members of the Council for the year 1907 are as follows: Reeve, Richard Howkins; Councillors, Angus Ross; Robert Spence; D. A. McFadyen, Thomas Robinson.

Members all present, and after subscribing to their declaration of property qualification and of office, were duly organized, with the Reeve in the chair.

McFadyen—Spence—That Dr. J. F. Ross be appointed Medical Health Officer for the year 1907 at a salary of \$20 per annum.—Carried.

By-law No. 294 appointing Dr. J. F. Ross of Kirkfield, M.H.O., for the year 1907 at a salary of \$20 for the year was read the usual number of times and passed.

Ross—Robinson—That James McGirr, of Bolsover, be appointed a member of the Board of Health for the current year.—Carried. By-law No. 295, in accordance therewith was passed.

Spence—Robinson—That W. A. Barker and F. J. McRea be appointed Auditors for the year 1907 at a salary of \$5 each, and a by-law appointing them be passed.—Carried.

Spence—Robinson—That Roger Moran be appointed assessor of the municipal property of the township of Eldon for the year 1907 at a salary of \$84.

Ross—McFadyen—In amendment, that Donald McPherson be appointed assessor of the municipality of Eldon at a salary of \$95.

The amendment carried on vote of the Reeve, and a by-law was passed appointing Mr. McPherson.

McFadyen—Ross—That the clerk be instructed to write The Watchman-Warder, The Post, and the Woodville Advocate for tenders for the municipal printing for the ensuing year.—Carried.

A tender from Farquhar Stewart for supplying cement slabs for the year 1907 at the following prices, was read: 8 inches in diameter, 12c per ft.; 6 inches, 18c per ft.; 10 inches, 24c per ft.; 12 inches, 26c per ft.; 15 inches, 46c per ft.; 18 inches, 65c per ft.; 24 in., 95c per ft.

McFadyen—Spence—That Farquhar Stewart be given the contract of supplying 150 pieces of cement 2 1/2 ft. long, as follows: 50 pieces 18 inches in diameter; \$1.60 per piece; 50 pieces 12 inches in diameter at 85 cents per piece; 50 pieces 8 in. in diameter at 45c per piece.—Carried.

Robinson—McFadyen—That Flora McInnes be exempted from paying taxes during the year 1906.—Carried. McFadyen—Robinson—That the col-
